28 Mile Race.

His pretty wife and two youngsters, who had cheered him on the way, almost cried for joy."

Pears Against Guns.

An AP dispatch from Dover, O., should boost the price of pears. "Tom Miller munched a pear as he drove his ice truck along the road. There were other pears on the seat beside him. He liked pears. Oregon First Seed State.

In the year of the greatest demand for field seeds Oregon has the largest supply of any state in the union, according to E. R. Jackman, extension agronomist at Oregon State college. The wide range of Oregon seed crops is indicated by the following list: Red, alsike, white, ladino, crimson, sweet and strawberry clovers; such grasses as Sudan, bent, Meadow foxtail, Reed canary, Kentucky blue, meadow fescue, tall fescue, smooth broom, blue joint, chew ings fescue, English rye, orchard, tall meadow oat, rough meadow, and crested wheat; and such other crops as yellow trefoil, soy beans, alfalfa, winter peas and vetches, horse beans, garden peas and certain grain varieties.

Industrial Mineral Testing.

Samples of northwestern non-metallic minerals are now being received at Oregon State college for chemical and geological analysis and testing to determine location, quality and extent of mineral deposits, which may be of value in the development of large industries using Bonneville power.
