Respond Generously to Appeal For Fire Relief at Bandon

A drive, conducted by the chamber of commerce through the schools, for clothing for those who lost everything in the tragic Bandon fire, resulted in a generous response far beyond expectations, said school officials. According to Supt. H. B. Ferrin the call reached the schools at 11:30 Tuesday forenoon and by the close of school that afternoon 132 bundles of clothing and some fruit had been turned in. The high school reported 25 bundles, the west side school 42, and the Central building 65. Much of the clothing had been freshly laundered and was in first class condition.

Victor Phelps, principal of the central building, reported two small youngsters, one a girl in the first grade and another a boy in the second grade, had emptied their savings banks and generously contributed the contents in amounts of 37 and 25 cents to the relief fund. Two small girls brought bundles of their freshly cleaned dresses and each bundle contained a doll for some distressed youngsters in the stricken area. Any persons having clothing are asked to leave donations at the city hall. Officials have stated that contributions in the form of cash and bedding are most needed at the present.

They returned home when conditions improved.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Godard of Coquille were visitors over the week end at the home of Mr. Godard's parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Godard. They had left home before news of the fire was broadcast. They started back Monday but Mrs. Godard and small daughter were forced to remain in Roseburg for several days. Mr. Godard drove on to Coquille and his truck and helpers were drafted into service for emergency work.

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Breedlove, who left early Sunday to visit a daughter, Mrs. George Hewitt, and family in Marshfield, were unable to return until Tuesday forenoon. Their description of conditions is most interesting and graphic. According to their report the air was filled with charred bits of wood and scarcely a leaf moved, the air was so still. Mrs. Breedlove said it was almost unbelievable the way emergencies were met with such promptness and efficiency. As refugees poured into the city they were given every care and consideration. Lodges and civic organizations turned their halls and club rooms into housing quarters, boy scouts responded immediately to calls for collecting clothing and food supplies appeared as if by magic. Citizens were in constant touch with the situation through radio reports and cooperated in every way to aid officials in their duties. In returning home the Breedloves met a number of convoy trucks carrying supplies and men to the stricken area.

Mrs. William Thum is in receipt of a letter from her son, Jack Beager, who is working for S. L. Godard in Coquille, which contained news of his safety and also numerous accounts of the emotional reaction of persons near the danger zone.
