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Nature Sketches

THE SCAUP.

When the frost tints the rushes a silver hue, and the cotton-woods stand leafless sentinel to winter's approach; the Scaup will be seen, floating magistically on the surface of the deep, dark pools of the river.

The Scaup duck (Fulix Marilla) inhabits the whole of North America, Europe and Asia. It is called Greater Scaup, or Blue-bill, as distinguished from the Lesser Scaup, or Little Black-head, and also in some localities, Broad-bill, and Trask-duck. Although not of brilliant plumage, the drake, because of the sharp contrast of color masses, is a very attractive figure.

The bill is short, and wide at the tip, light blue-grey and edged with black. The eye is golden yellow, set in a head of black, velvety feathers; which extend down the neck to the finely penciled back and panel. The tail is black. The front and breast are white. The wings are dark brown, the shoulder feathers of which are penciled with white. The secondaries are white. The feet and legs are dark grey and are attached to the body farther back than on most ducks.

The Scaup is a diving duck. Its food varies somewhat from that of other ducks, in that it includes a large quantity of small snail, crustacea, and occasionally fish. In some sections, because of this, it is not esteemed for its flesh.

Its length is about 19 inches, and extent of wing 29. The female wears the same color markings,

but in brown instead of black.

The Lesser Scaup (Fulix affinis) Little Black-head, or Creek Broad-bill, is closely allied to the preceding, but is much smaller. Its range is about the same as that of the Greater Scaup. In color and markings it is an exact duplicate of Fulix Marilla.

It is called Creek Broad-bill because of its habit of frequenting small streams. Ring Bill (Fulix collaris) inhabits the whole of North America, breeding far north, wintering in the United States and beyond. It reaches south to Guatemala, Cuba and Jamaica. It is called in some sections "Bastard Broad-bill." It resembles the two preceding species, in markings and color, except the bill has a white ring just back of the broad part. Its head feathers are fluffier, giving it a tufted appearance, and is known in some areas as Tufted Duck.

These ducks fly swiftly and offer the hunter a difficult target. They decoy well to a proper set, in fact too well. I have had them sail in and alight among my decoys while I was standing out of the blind, unhidden.

These ducks can be told in flight by their short neck, large, round head, and sharp contrast of black and white. In flight the body appears totally white. On the water, when not alarmed, they swim with head drawn down close to the body, and appear from a distance as a small black and white chunk.
