**Lane County Doubles Fire Disaster Quota**

Cash contributions for the Bandon fire relief, solicited through the Red Cross society, had reached \$54 the early part of the week. They expected to leave there Tuesday of this week to continue their trip eastward. They reported a pleasant trip thus far and were enthused over the gorgeous mountain scenery.

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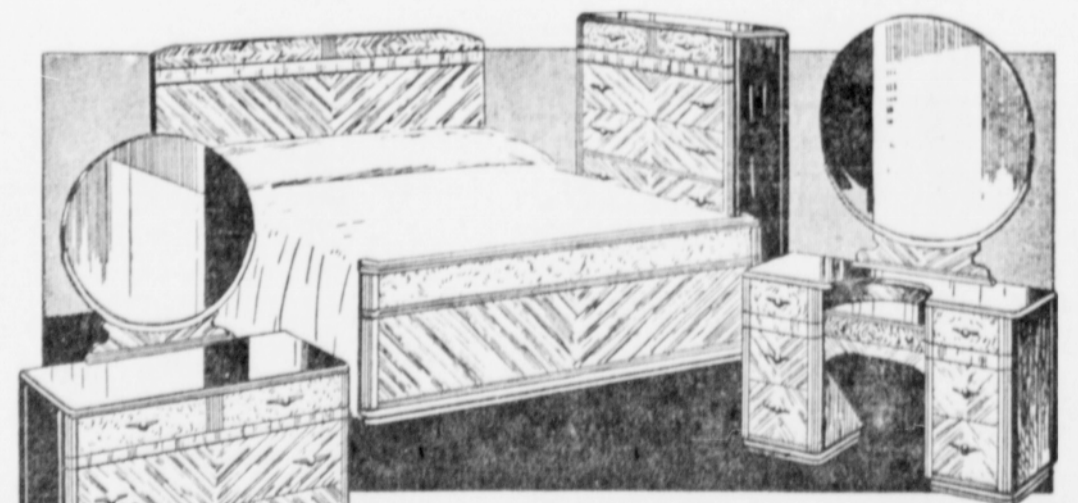
