Bede Speaks C. of C. On Proposed Bill

"Never before have such dictatorial powers been suggested for public officials as those proposed for the state power commission in the state power bill that will be up in November. Never before has there been a greater threat of plunging the state into a great spending program and never before a greater threat of taking a huge amount of property from the tax rolls," Elbert Bede, former Cottage Grove editor and now associated with Oregon Business & Investors Inc., told the chamber of commerce at its noon luncheon Tuesday.

"The state power bill would empower the state power commission to do anything and everything that it might consider necessary or convenient to construction and conduct of a state wide power business. The commission would itself be the judge of what might be necessary or convenient, so there is no limit to what such a commission could do so long as it remained within the constitution and within its funds.

"So far as I can see it could establish industries for the manufacture of meters, of wire, of cross-

arms, of lumber, of timbers, of concrete. It is specifically authorized to develop minerals or other deposits it may find upon state lands so it could undoubtedly go into the smelter business and could manufacture mining machinery.

"I see no reason why it couldn't establish grocery stores and department stores for the convenience of its employees," said Mr. Bede.

"The possibilities may be far-fetched, but I venture that through the years many candidates for power commissioner would like to try to do these things.

"The power bill would be an empty shell without the \$18,000,000 which it authorizes upon another vote by the people, so those who vote for the bill may be expected to later vote for the bonds.

"And \$18,000,000 won't be a start. Those who propose this power bill proposed a similar bill two years ago in which they asked nearly \$60,000,000. Even that greater amount isn't sufficient to duplicate private power utility property we now have. Transmission lines from Bonneville will cost close to \$30,000,000, upon authority of a report to the state planning board.

"At least \$65,000,000 of property upon which \$2,500,000 in taxes is now being paid would leave the tax rolls if the state power bill should do what it is expected to do," stated Mr. Bede.
