Nature Sketches

Author's Note: Looking over a synopsis of the hunting laws, I found the 1936 migratory bird clause named several species not before included in the "no open season" list. I also discovered the shooting season opens Nov. 1st at 7 a. m. and closes Nov. 30, at 4 p. m. and that you must have a Federal Duck Stamp.

To some the regulations embodied in the clause evoke disgust. They contend, after observing a concentration point during dry weather, that there is a definite increase in the species. Others contend the regulations are not adequate to cope with the desperate condition of the birds, complicated by the serious drought conditions of the past few years.

Perhaps some of the readers of this column, who will be going hunting November first, are not familiar with conditions in the water fowl problem, and also are not able to identify all the species protected by "no open season." Realizing that possibility, the following seven birds described in this column, will be the ducks so protected. Also, I will endeavor to display at a convenient place, maps of shooting zones, and other water fowl data, including color sketches of the protected list.

The Red Head (*Aythya americana*) called also Pochard, inhabits the whole of North America. It is a common associate of the Canvas-back and much resembles it; the likeness is so close it is often mistaken for the latter bird.

It is about twenty inches long and twenty six inches in extent of wing. The neck is short, head round and of a bright venetian red, the bill is short and bluish grey. The panel is white, pencilled with black, breast white, and wings brownish grey and dark brown.

Canvas-back (*Aythya valisineria*) inhabits the whole of North America. Breeds in the Northern and Middle States, and winters southward to Guatemala. In color and markings it is identical to the Red head, except the head is much darker. The Canvas-back is a large duck, about twenty two inches long and thirty one inches in extent of wing. I have killed specimens weighing four and a half pounds. It is an excellent diver, strong and fast flier, and a superior table bird. Its principal food is a delicate water plant called wild celery (*vallisneria*) which is said to give the flesh its delicate flavor.

The Canvas-back may be distinguished from the Red Head by the long black bill which is very thick at the base, narrow at the tip. The neck is long and the head not so

round. The Butter Ball (*Clangula albeola*) inhabits the United States, Cuba and Mexico. It is called Spirit Duck, Buffle head, Butter box, Marionette, Dipper, Die Dipper and Little Golden Eye. It is one of the smallest ducks, being only fourteen inches long.

This is a very attractive little duck, and can be told easily in flight. The body is for the most part pure white, the head is large, covered with dark, iridescent, blue feathers, capped with a tuft of fluffy white, which extends under and a little in front of the eye. The back and wings are of the same iridescent blue of the head.

The legs pink, bill light grey. The female is a dark brownish slate, with a white spot on the cheek. This duck is an excellent diver, its extreme celerity suggesting the title, Spirit Duck. It flies with great velocity, and usually but a few feet above the surface of the water.

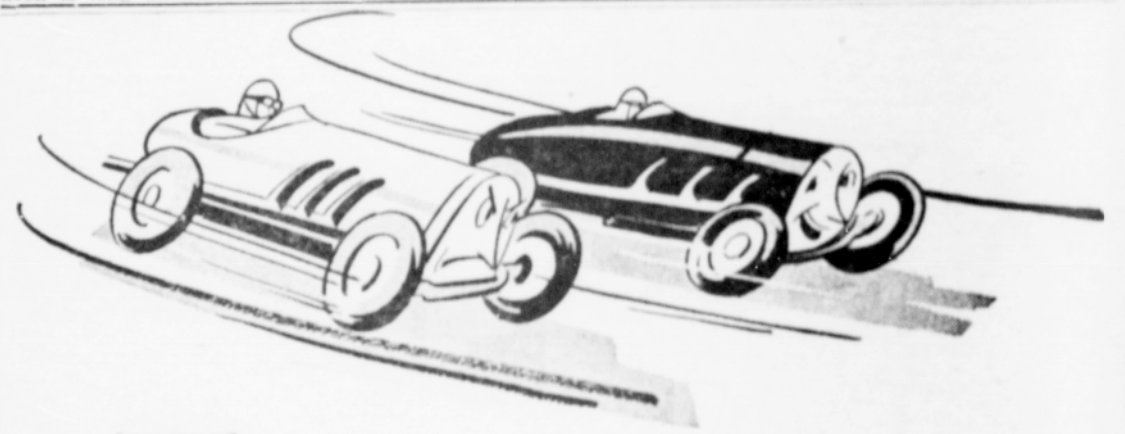
The offices of the Umpqua National Forest has received a telegram indicating that the Governor has issued a proclamation extending indefinitely the season for fire permits.
