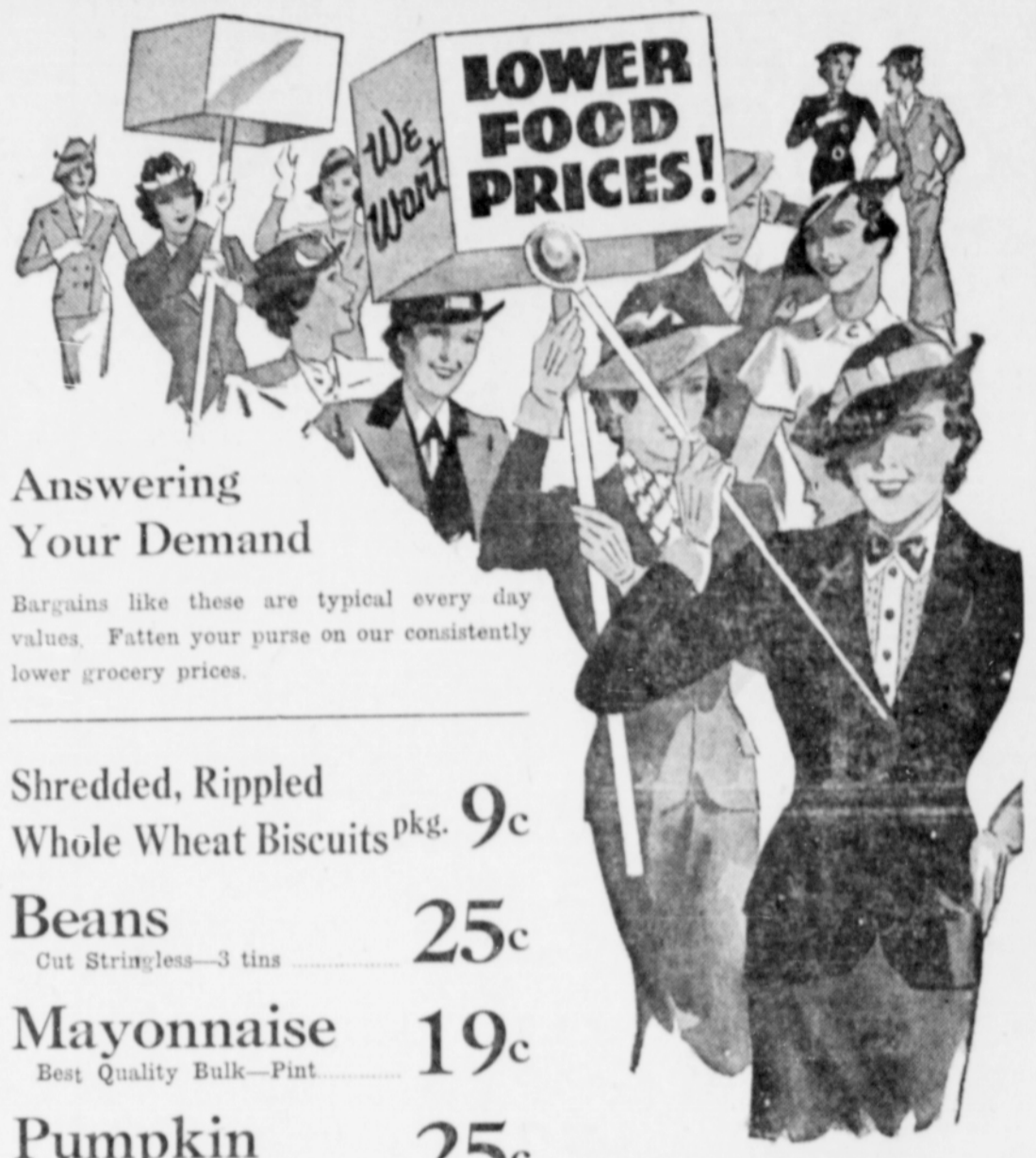
Junior Dugan has been absent
