

Red Cross Roll Call to be Under Way Soon

Miss Irene Ritchie, Lane county Red Cross executive, accompanied by Mrs. Alice Maxwell, state field representative of Oregon, was in the city Monday working with members of the local Red Cross board in preparation for the annual Red Cross roll call which will be started in November.

Mrs. Maxwell had just returned from Bandon where she was in charge of emergency work following the disastrous fire which swept that city a few weeks ago. Mrs. Maxwell was the first official worker to reach the field and related a number of human interest stories. The gratitude of Bandon victims for the generosity of their Oregon friends in sending relief immediately as word reached neighboring counties was pathetic in its sincerity, said Mrs. Maxwell. In many cases tears of joy were shed and throughout the emergency which they faced, following a few short hours of complete destruction, the courage and fortitude displayed, with no words of complaint uttered, was typical of true pioneer spirit, according to Mrs. Maxwell.

Every family and individual, known to have been a resident of Bandon at the time of the fire, has been accounted for, said the relief worker, and a family unit system has been organized which provides temporary care for all. Permanent rehabilitation has started and work in building and establishing homes and business centers will proceed as plans are made known.
