## Attendance at School Increases

Registration of students in the city schools continues to increase during the close of the first six weeks period. The total registration in high school to date is 376. The west side school has an enrollment of 217 pupils and the central building has an enrollment of 257.

A sliding scale of enrollment during the first month for the past ten years, which may be of interest to school patrons, follows: High school for 1927, 210; 1928, 255; 1929, 260; 1930, 263; 1931, 290; 1932, 260; 1933, 285; 1934, 270; 1935, 320; 1936, 370. Grade schools 1927, 535; 1928, 462; 1929, 504; 1930, 475; 1931, 466; 1932, 435; 1933, 477; 1934, 465; 1935, 455; 1936, 465.

The noticeable increase in the high school is probably due to a greater number of students from outside districts, according to Supt. H. B. Ferrin. Forty-two per cent of students are from other districts. Another possible reason is that 90 per cent of the eighth grade graduates are entering high school as compared with a smaller per cent of former years. A great drop in attendance, especially in the high school, may be noticed during the height of the depression. This may have been due to the number of families who left the community to seek work elsewhere. It is the belief of school officials here and in other districts that the decreased enrollment in the grades is

partly due to the fact that there are fewer children in the average family of today.
