Nature Sketches

Continuing Protected List of Water Fowl.

Ruddy Duck (*Grismatura rubida*) inhabits the whole of North America, southward to Guatemala, where it breeds. It inhabits Cuba in season. It is a small duck measuring fourteen and a half inches in length and twenty-one inches in extent of wing, and is very plain in color, both male and female are a ruddy brown, the male has a light buff ring, about one-half inch wide, just back of the bill and in front of the eye. While swimming it carries its head tucked close to the back, and tail drawn up in almost a perpendicular line. It is a good diver and feeds in deep water as well as shallow bays and inlets. It is not powerful on the rise, paddling the water for a great distance before being under wing, nevertheless when under wing it flies with great velocity and is one of the strongest fliers on migration.

Wood Duck (*Aix sponsa*) is perhaps the most beautiful bird in North America. It inhabits all of North America, breeding in all parts, wintering in the south. It prefers for breeding the hollow of a tree, and sometimes several yards from water. When the young are hatched the mother carries them to the water, one by one, in her bill.

The Wood Duck, sometimes called "Summer Duck" very rarely visits the seashore, preferring the small muddy lakes and streams inland. It never flies in large flocks, usually three and four, and most commonly, pairs or singly. It is so brilliantly colored and intricately marked as to render it indescribable. Its length is about 19 inches and extent of wing 29 inches.

Relocation of Highway Hearing Here December 1

State highway officials have announced that a public hearing will be held in Cottage Grove Dec. 1, relative to the proposed rerouting of the Pacific Highway through this city.

No definite information is available as to the location desired by the highway commission. Statements have been made in the past that the highway must be routed away from the public schools. Rumors have been circulated that the proposed route will require construction of a new highway from the south side of the city parallel with the Southern Pacific tracks, to the intersection of Main and Ninth streets, but the rumor has not been confirmed.

Better Bakery Adds Latest Equipment

The Better Bakery has recently completed the installation of the latest type Master Baker tray type travel oven, heated by gas, and controlled by an electrically operated thermostat. The new oven, weighing more than four tons, and insulated with spun glass wool, will greatly increase the capacity of the bakery.

Any desired baking temperature can be secured within 15 or 20 minutes time, and this temperature maintained exactly during the entire baking period.

In addition to the oven, other modern equipment has been added, including an electrically operated moulder, a bun divider, and two new steel bread racks.

Installing the new equipment has made necessary the rearranging of the plant, and this has been carried out in a manner that will result in the "saving of time in the various bakery operations."

"Our baking capacity now is almost unlimited," Cecil Beck, proprietor of the bakery told a Sentinel reporter. "We will use the new oven for cakes and pies as well as bread, and due to the fact that we can maintain exact oven temperatures at any desired heat we will be able to improve the quality of all our products."

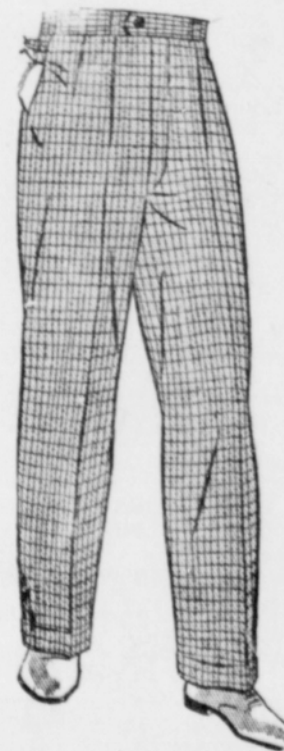
