Republican Speakers Draw Good Crowd; New Deal Grilled

Carleton Spencer Speaks in Behalf of Military Training; Rodman Scores New Deal.

A well filled house greeted the republican candidates for Lane county offices at the Cottage Grove armory Monday night—"candidates night." All candidates for office were present with the exception of Dr. Orville Waller, candidate for state representative, who was detained at the last moment by a professional call.

The meeting, arranged by the Lane county young republicans, with John Pennington in charge of local arrangements, who opened the meeting, later turning it over to Robert Fischer of Eugene, gave the Cottage Grove voters a chance to meet personally the republican party nominees and to hear them talk briefly.

Carleton Spencer, professor of law at the University of Oregon, was the first speaker. Mr. Spencer spoke in favor of compulsory military training. He stated his firm opposition to war, but also his belief that this nation must have an adequate military force as the best preventative of war. He stated that compulsory military training at the university did not work any hardship upon the students, and that they were better able to spare the time than any other class of men their age. "They are the safest men to have trained," the speaker added, "if we really want to keep out of war. Their studies at the university teach them the futility and economic loss of war."

Following Mr. Spencer's talk, Mr. Pennington turned the meeting over to Mr. Fischer, who gave a short talk and an urgent appeal for all registered voters to exercise their right to vote. He then introduced C. A. Huntington, chairman of the Lane county republican central committee, who requested the voters' support of the state and national candidates. He urged a vote of confidence for Senator McNary and Congressman Mott, who, he said, were two of the most valuable men to the state ever sent to Washington.

Other candidates introduced, who spoke briefly, were: Chas. P. Poole, coronor, who asked for another term, and assured the voters that he would continue to operate his office on a fair and impartial basis; Frank E. Hyland, county commissioner; and P. M. Morse, surveyor; Owen H. Jones, candidate for assessor, who aroused hearty applause when he expressed his opposition to the practice of increasing taxes on property because the owner had spent money and time in improving its appearance, either by painting the buildings or improving the grounds; W. B. Dillard, county clerk, who told of the many duties and responsibilities of his office; C. A. Swartz, sheriff, who asked for another term, and stated that he was better qualified for the office now than four years ago; Frank B. Reid, candidate for district attorney, who scored against his opponent, the incumbent, for his lack of results during the recent "vice crusade" in Eugene, stating that many of the complaints were dropped because they were improperly prepared; Eugene V. Slatery, candidate for state representative, conceded the election of Earl Hill and Dr. Waller, who seek the other two vacancies for this office, and assured those present of his ability to work with these men.

James Rodman, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce, and a talented speaker, closed the program of the evening with a scathing denunciation of the New Deal administration and urged the voters to vote the ticket straight.

Several accidents have occurred at the intersection of Fifth and Main the past few months, owing to the sharp corner there, and excessive speed. At least two signs will be installed, a 25 mile speed limit sign near the Motor Inn service station, and a "slow down" sign nearer to Main street.

L. W. Coiner reported to the chamber of commerce Tuesday noon that as the result of action taken by that body in requesting the installation of warning signs on south Fifth, the highway department had advised him that the matter would be taken care of promptly.

City Election Grows Warm As Time for Voting Draws Near

J. W. Veatch Seeks Mayoralty Election As "Write In"—Other Posts Also Contested

From all indications the city election in Cottage Grove will be as close, and the outcome as much in doubt until the last vote is counted, as the national election.

While but one name appears on the official ballot for mayor, that of Cleo Morelock, friends of J. W. Veatch are waging a campaign for him for this office as an independent. Petitions circulated in his behalf were filed after the deadline, thus preventing his name appearing on the official ballot. As a result, he will be a "write-in" candidate.

Two men are candidates for the office of city recorder: L. W. Coiner, incumbent, and H. A. Ellsworth. Both have a strong following.

Earl C. Ballew has no opposition on the ballot for city treasurer, nor does there appear to be any organized opposition to his candidacy.

Emmett L. Nowell of Ketchikan, Alaska, Visits Father Here.

"Ketchikan had a dry year last year—only 10 feet, 7 inches of rain fell," said Emmett L. Nowell of that city, one of The Sentinel's Alaska subscribers, who paid Cottage Grove a brief visit over the week end.

Mr. Nowell, a native of Cottage Grove, and a son of Willis Nowell of this city, is chief engineer for the Ketchikan Public Utilities. He has been a resident of Alaska for the past ten and a half years, during which time he has made but two trips "out" to the states. He arrived in Seattle September 20 and underwent a sinus operation, from which he was recovering so satisfactorily that he was able to start his return trip Sunday.

"Folks in Cottage Grove used to complain a lot about rain, but we really have rain in Ketchikan, and think nothing of it. Last year the precipitation totaled 128.99 inches, but the average rainfall totals 137.61 inches."

To prove his statements Mr. Nowell handed The Sentinel reporter a clipping from the Ketchikan Chronicle of January 5. This showed the dry month of the year to be July, with a rainfall of 4.40 inches, and December the wet month with a total of 23.36 inches. The highest temperature recorded for the year was 75 above, and the lowest 4 above January 18.

Mr. Nowell is enthusiastic over his adopted city. He states that Alaska has enjoyed the largest salmon pack in history during the past season and that business is good in other lines.

Voters Faced With Large Ballot; May Use Pencil 32 Times

No Opposition on Judiciary Ballot, or for County School Superintendent; 8 Amendments

Cottage Grove voters going to the polls next Tuesday will be presented with a somewhat formidable appearing sheet of paper, 12x24 inches in size, bearing the names of more than 60 men, and will have the privilege of voting for about half this number. In addition, eight proposed amendments are submitted for their consideration.

The official ballot offers five candidates for president: Alfred M. Landon, republican; Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic; Norman Thomas, independent; William Lemke, independent, and John W. Alkin, socialist labor.

Five candidates seek election to the United States Congress: Eric N. Hass, socialist labor; Willis Mahoney, democratic; Chas. L. McNary, republican; Clarence Rudder, independent; Albert Streiff, independent. Vote for one.

James W. Mott has but one opponent for congress, E. W. Kirkpatrick, democratic. Vote for one.

Rufus C. Holman, republican, is opposed by U. S. Burt, democratic candidate and Don Sweetland, independent candidate, for state treasurer.

I. H. VanWinkle, republican, is opposed by Alfred P. Dobson, democratic candidate, and J. E. Hosmer, independent, for attorney-general.

For representative from the fourteenth district in the state legislature, Earl H. Hill, Eugene V. Slatery and A. Orville Waller, republicans, are opposed by N. E. Glass, Clarence F. Hyde, and Ralph P. Laird, democrats. Vote for three.

L. L. Ray, democrat, and Frank B. Reid, republican, seek election as district attorney.

On the county ballot Owen H. Jones, republican, and Welby Stevens, democrat, are candidates for county assessor.

W. B. Dillard, republican, and Lester G. Porter, democrat, are candidates for county clerk.

Frank E. Hyland, republican, and C. M. Young, democrat, seek office as county commissioner.

Chas. P. Poole, republican, Clarence V. Simon, independent, and Marion Veatch, democrat, are candidates for county coroner.

C. A. Swartz, republican, and Walter W. Edmiston, democrat, are candidates for sheriff.

P. M. Morse, republican, and Charles E. Mercer, democratic, are candidates for county surveyor.

Green Pitcher, unopposed candidate for constable, bears both the republican and democratic endorsements.

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Considerable interest prevails in the race for councilmen. In the first ward W. L. Workman and Fred Knickerbocker are candidates for the four year term and E. R. Wiese and Ralph W. Hawley for the two year term.

In the second ward Hiram Griggs, C. Elmer Neet and W. J. Bartels are candidates. The third ward race is between J. F. Safley and Harry Rentle.

Voters in the first precinct will cast their ballots at the Masonic building. Those in precinct two at the city hall, precinct three at the high school gymnasium, and precinct four at the C. M. Parker residence near Safley's store.

Registration has been heavy, and it is anticipated that one of the largest votes on record will be cast.

Virgil Horn Going Strong On Eastern Oregon Team

Eastern Oregon Normal School, La Grande, Oct. 28.—The fleetest backfield man and one of the best ground gainers on Coach Bob Quinn's 1936 edition of Mountaineer football is Virgil Horn, four years a halfback for Cottage Grove high school and twice all-Willamette valley conference half and a transfer here from Ashland Normal school. Horn has started in all four games for E. O. N. this year.

Horn is a consistent gainer on long end runs, reverses and pass plays, and is one of the best open-field runners in the country.

Eastern Oregon Normal has won two and dropped two in its four starts so far this season. Five games remain on the schedule.

Traffic Heavy Above Culp Creek.

Forest Ranger H. E. D. Brown reported Tuesday at the chamber of commerce meeting that a traffic count held at a bridge east of Culp Creek this summer indicated that more than 80 vehicles were using the highway that day. Traffic between Culp Creek and Cottage Grove is much greater. Despite the growing importance of the roads in that section, they remain in need of hard surfacing. The chamber is backing a move to have funds for the improvement of this highway included in the next county budget.

Former Residents Visit.

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Jensen, former residents now living at Point Arena, Cal., arrived Friday for a two weeks' visit with friends in the city. Mr. Jensen was in the employment of the Southern Pacific at Latham from 1913 to 1918. The visitors, when calling at The Sentinel office, remarked about the many changes which had taken place in the city since they left 18 years ago. However many of their friends are still living in the city and they were receiving a warm welcome.

Trailer Demolished by Truck.

Divide, October 27.—(Special)—An accident occurred Sunday about a half mile north of here when a car with trailer, driven by Walter Stone of Buena, Wash., was reported crowded off the highway by a heavy freight truck. No one was injured but the trailer was completely demolished. The driver of the truck, when stopped in Roseburg, said he didn't know of the collision. It was reported however that the fenders of the truck showed marks where it had struck the other car.

Highway Engineers Complete Survey of Lorane-Anlauf Road

Highway engineers who have been stationed at Cottage Grove for several weeks while engaged in surveying for a proposed secondary highway between Lorane and Anlauf left Tuesday for Marshfield and Bandon.

While the engineers were non-committal as to the results of their survey, it is understood that they checked several routes. Despite the fact that the proposed road lies almost in a straight line between Anlauf and Monroe, county officials are denying that the proposed road is eventually to become an important part of Pacific highway, it is reported.

Game Will Be Between Local High and Springfield High; All Business Houses to Close.

Friday will be a gala day in the city when all Cottage Grove will join with the high school in celebrating annual "homecoming." The main feature of attraction offered will be a football game between the Lions and Springfield high. The game is called for 2:30 and all business houses, through the generous cooperation of business men, will close between the hours of 2:30 and 4.

The loud roar of the Lions will be heard as they snarl and claw in what may prove to be a desperate attempt to maintain their undefeated standing of the year. Comparative scores give the locals a slight edge but dope means nothing, said Coach Curtis French, where rivalry is as keen as exists between the two schools. Springfield defeated Oakridge 59-0 as compared to Cottage Grove's victory of 46-0. However they only held Roseburg to a tie while the locals defeated the Indians 20-0.
