DEBT—

DICTATOR—

In 1863 Congressman Valandigham of Ohio stated that "the secret purpose of the war was to abolish slavery in the States and WITH IT the change of our present Democratic form of government into an IMPERIAL Despotism."

The war for state rights and individual liberties was lost at Appomattox, and it is strange indeed to hear the Republican party—born of Federalism—loudly demanding a return to Democracy and individualism.

And it is interesting to note a little quotation from A. Lincoln:

"It has long been a question whether any government which is not too strong for the liberties of the people can be strong enough to maintain itself."

NEW DEAL

It seems to us that this country could do with less criticism of methods and more constructive adaptation to the needs of modern life. Again invoking the spirit of the great Emancipator we find him saying: "I shall adapt new views, so fast as they shall appear to be true views—the occasion is piled high with difficulty, and we must rise with the occasion. As our case is new—so we must think anew and act anew."

Why cannot we accept the fact that the difficulties of the times demand new methods and new ideals of government; and either uphold those who are striving to better conditions; OR offer a better plan for that purpose.

bell and Harry H. Belt are candidates for judges of the supreme court without party designation. Three are to be elected, so you may vote for each.

Laurence C. Moffitt is unopposed for county school superintendent.

If you favor amending the old age assistance act of 1935 to conform with the federal social security act, vote 300 yes. If opposed, vote 301 no.

If you favor the repeal of the existing advertising laws, vote 302 yes. If opposed, vote 303 no.

While everyone in the state may vote on the Tax Limitation amendment for school districts, only schools in Portland qualify. Vote 304 yes, or 305 no.

If you are opposed to compulsory military training at state institutions of higher education, vote 308 yes. If you favor the present system, vote 309 no.

If you favor the compulsory reduction of taxes on tangible property, vote 310 yes. If you are opposed, vote 311 no.

If you favor the state power bill, vote 312 yes. If you are opposed to it, vote 313 no. If you vote yes on this one, you will probably wish to vote 314 yes, for it is a companion amendment setting up provisions for administration. If you are opposed, vote 315 no.

A vote for 316 yes is a vote for the state bank bill. Vote 317 no if you are opposed to this bill.

Prison Parole Old

The history of parole goes back to English Colonial experience in the ticket-of-leave system of New South Wales as early as 1790 and to the mark system of Captain Macnochie at Norfolk island in 1840, in both of which the prisoner might by good behavior win conditional liberation.

FRANK REID'S PLATFORM

I believe in strict and impartial law enforcement and that the District Attorney should personally conduct the trial of all major criminal cases, and that all cases which are prosecuted should be prosecuted vigorously.

I believe in a thorough investigation of all criminal matters which come to the attention of the District Attorney for two reasons: First, for the protection of a citizen whose reputation may be ruined by the bringing of a criminal charge which is unjustified and which could be ascertained by such an investigation, and second, to save the taxpayers the expense of prosecuting cases upon which it is impossible to obtain a conviction.

I believe that professional criminals should be shown no leniency but should be prosecuted with all the rigor that the law allows. I do not believe that this rule applies to first offenders. I believe that the District Attorney is the main cog in the "wheel of law enforcement". That the responsibility for the enforcement of all the laws of the County rest squarely upon his shoulders and if elected I shall assume this responsibility.
