Grange Head Defends Stand on Power Bill

The following are some of the high lights of Pomona Grange Master Gill's speech on the power measures proposed by the Grange.

There are two power bills on the ballot November 3 which were initiated by the Oregon State Grange. They are the State Power Bill and the State Hydroelectric Temporary Administrative Board Constitutional Amendment. Voters who vote for the State Power Bill should also vote for the Temporary Administrative Board Amendment, otherwise the State Power Act will not be effective until the Commission is elected at the next general election two years hence.

The State Power Bill is proposed in accordance with the State Constitutional Amendment passed by the voters in 1932. Following that election the legislature passed a State Power Act to carry out the provisions set forth in that constitutional amendment. This was signed by Governor Meier but was attacked by private power interests and held up for two years by the referendum and came to a vote at the election two years ago. It was defeated by a small majority, largely due to propaganda put forth by the private power companies to the effect that the Grange Power Bill was not needed because the Government would build transmission lines from Bonville to all parts of the State. Two years have gone by and the Gov-

ernment has done nothing toward building such transmission lines, nor is there any indication that it will do so.

Under the laws of Oregon, cities and utility districts have the right for public ownership of power. The Government is building several large power plants throughout the nation and others have been completed. Do you believe that the Bonneville power plant is a good thing for the people of the Pacific Northwest? If so, you believe in public ownership of power. Is it not strange that when cities, districts, and the Government all have the right to engage in public ownership of power that this right is denied to the State of Oregon?

Shall we be controlled by electricity, or shall the people own it themselves and make it their instrument for prosperity and happiness? The people of Oregon cannot enjoy any feeling of security that they will be protected against exorbitant power rates by regulatory bodies. Even though our public service commissioner should be actuated by sincere desire and effort to reduce power rates, court battles would rob him of any chance for really securing reduced rates. It is hopeless to look to regulatory bodies to establish reasonable rates. Wherever public ownership has been established, lower rates have followed. Public ownership of power is the only successful regulator.
