

High School Notes

The newly organized boys' federation met Friday, October 23 and elected the following officers: President, Herschel Tracy; vice president, Mike McKibben; secretary, Mac Trask; sergeant-at-arms, Don Thies. Sam Mackin gave a talk concerning the football team and other activities and Supt. H. B. Ferrin explained the objective of the organization. James Lewis led in singing.
