General Election News

President Roosevelt has carried every county in Oregon, nearly doubling the vote of Landon. He also leads in every state in the union except Maine and Vermont. Indications now are that the democrats now holding 322 of the 435 seats in Congress, might increase their majority by from 10 to 20 members. Available returns indicate that the U. S. Senate lineup will be 73 Democrats, 19 Republicans, 2 Farmer-Laborites, 1 progressive and 1 independent.

The Senate race in this state shows that McNary is leading Mahoney 5871 to 5132 votes. Mott leads Kirkpatrick 7026 to 3208.

This game, always one of the most interesting of the year, will be played in varsity style in honor of the visiting dads, it is announced by Anse Cornell, athletic manager. The university band, yell section and stunts between halves will rival any of the

varsity games for show and color, it is announced.

Saturday fathers will have their annual mass meeting in the morning, will lunch with sons and daughters at noon, and will then gather around radios to hear reports of the Oregon-California game that will be played in Berkeley.

The annual Dad's Day banquet will be held at 6 o'clock in John Straub Memorial building. John Veatch, Portland, an Oregon "dad" and a prominent alumnus of the university, will deliver the address of the evening, and advance reports are that it will be of unusual interest.

Following the banquet fathers will be left free for "an evening with dad" a feature that has in the past been far more popular than scheduled entertainments.

On Sunday special services honoring fathers will be held in all Eugene churches, and at noon fathers will be guests at living organizations.
