Motor Killings

According to Secretary of State Snell motor vehicle fatalities in Oregon reached a new high in October, when 42 persons were killed. The previous high mark was in October, 1934, when 34 persons were killed. Nineteen were killed in October, 1935. For the first ten months this year 257 persons were killed in motor vehicle accidents as compared with the same period last year. A total of 773 were injured last month as against 585 in October, 1935. Eleven of the October fatalities occurred in Multnomah county.

HELEN M. MICHAEL, 15, Eugene, selected by State Club Leader H. C. Seymour as the year's most all-around club girl in Oregon, wins an all-expense trip to the 15th National Club Congress to be held in Chicago, Nov. 27-Dec. 5. Miss Michael has been a club girl since eligible, and has completed projects in news and playwriting, home beautification, room improvement, homemaking, clothing, cooking, canning, camp cookery, flowers, marketing, livestock, rabbits, poultry, and health. She was state grand champion in room improvement the last two years, and home-making champion this year. She gave 12 public demonstrations, among them the state championship demonstrations in canning, cooking, and "dollar dinner". Her prize winnings total \$396.13 and her total sales \$1,573.62. She will compete with other western state champions for regional honors, and if successful will be a contender for one of three cash scholarships of \$400, \$300, and \$200, given by Montgomery Ward, sponsor of the contest, together with Chicago trips and county medals.

Plead For Food

Alaska and Hawaii are running low on food and other necessities on account of the maritime strike and have put in pleas to the government to charter ships to move supplies to these strike-isolated territories. The navy ordered a survey of its supply ships to determine which vessels might be used if the President authorized the move.
