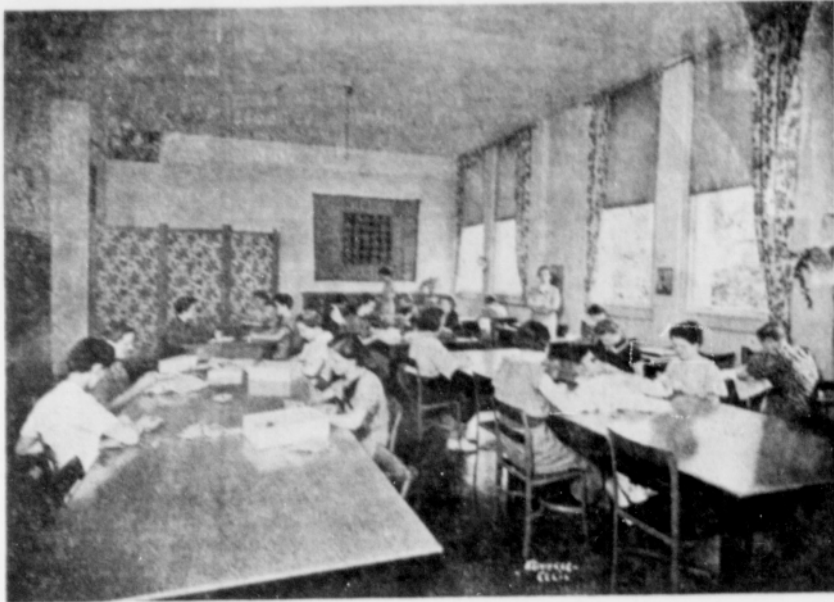


COTTAGE GROVE CLOTHING ROOM AFTER REMODELING

Mrs. Hopkins stated in her letter that they had spent a pleasant evening together the night of December 2 and the following morning Mr. Hopkins was found dead in bed. Services were held in the south and the remains cremated.

Mr. and Mrs. Hopkins lived here more than 20 years ago. Mr. Hopkins was engaged in farming in the Mosby creek country. Mrs. Hopkins taught school in the grades here at one time.

Alice Withers Hawley.

Mrs. Alice Withers Hawley died Monday forenoon at the family home at Divide. Mrs. Hawley was born in Douglas county, Oregon, and had lived at the present Hawley home 49 years following her marriage to James H. Hawley, who preceded her in death six years ago.

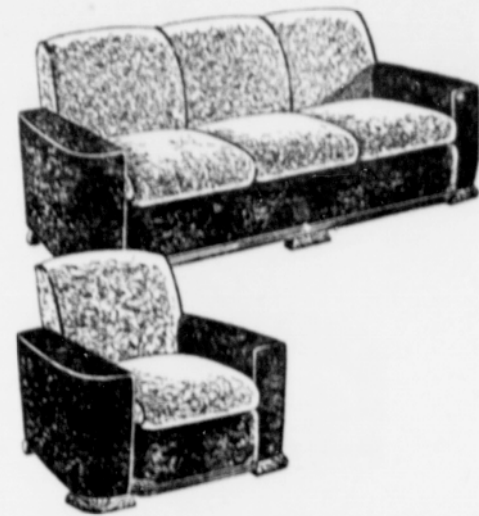
The remains are at Mills chapel and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

U. S.—Canadian Trade Up

A recent report of the State Department shows that trade with Canada, both incoming and outgoing, has increased since the Canadian-American agreement came into operation on January 1, 1936.

Canadian imports from the United States during January through September of this year were valued at \$266,000,000 as compared with \$262,000,000 as compared with \$204,233,000,000 in the first 9 months of 1935, a gain of \$33,000,000. United States imports from Canada during the same period were valued at \$262,000,000 as compared with \$204,000,000 a gain of \$58,000,000.

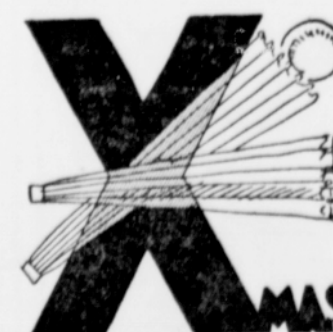
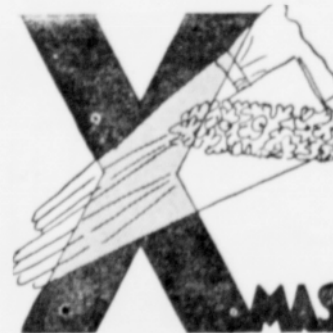
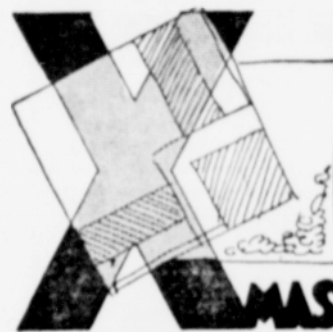
