FARMERS SEEK

STRIKE LEGISLATION

The Oregon Producers and Shippers association through its president, James B. Adams, announces that in every agricultural section of Oregon there is a growing demand for immediate legislation which will outlaw strikes and lock-outs until every possible means of arbitration has been exhausted. Mr. Adams says in part: "As means of self-protection and self-preservation, agricultural groups in every part of the state plan to sponsor and urge the passage of a measure requiring a 30-day truce while the state board of conciliation endeavors to bring about a settlement of disputed points between employer and labor," said Mr. Adams. "Such a measure would at least help to prevent the chaos which now exists in the agricultural industry as a result of the current maritime strike."

Attention is called to the fact that the strike came when Hood River apple and pear growers were in the midst of shipping their fruit and that for more than a

month they have been compelled to ship their fruit by rail to British Columbia for transshipment by water. This has cost them more than six cents in added freight charges and has cut down their markets; the wheat growers have millions of bushels in storage which they are not able to market and are paying thousands of dollars in additional storage on account of the strike; the same situation confronts wool growers, hop growers, fruit growers and other branches of the farming industry; thousands of cases of the finest canned fruits and vegetables packed almost to the rafters in the warehouses that cannot be taken to market because our water-borne transportation is paralyzed. Mr. Adams also states that the farmers are not interested in fighting the battles of the employers, but they are interested in protecting themselves and the public and they simply want a law which will compel employer and labor to submit their differences to an impartial board of conciliation before they are permitted to paralyze the agricultural industry and bring want and suffering into nearly every home in this state.

Nature Sketches

SHELDRAKE

There is probably no other water fowl in existence today so little understood as the Sheldrake. It is mistaken for every other fowl that flies, including the great Canada goose.

Its flesh is not edible because it feeds exclusively on fish.

We have three species of this kind in North America. All are very beautiful birds, expert swimmers and divers.

The most common of this family (Mergus Merganser Americanus) is quite abundant on our coast, it is sometimes called Loon, Shab and Fish Duck. However it is very different from them. It is slender of body and smaller. Its created head is purplish black, neck white which color extends full length of under part of body and up along sides and under the wings. The primaries and secondaries of wings are also white. The bill is very slender and lined around with teeth-like edges.

The end of the upper mandible curves sharply down and is pointed. Once a fish is between the Sheldrake's mandibles, escape is impossible.

Red Breasted Sheldrake, (Mergus serrator) inhabits the whole of North America but is more abundant along the eastern coast. Coloring in this species vary considerably according to season and age. However, they may be easily identified by the brick red of breast.

Hooded Sheldrake (Lophodytes cucullatus) Hooded Merganser,

quite common on our coast, around saltwater bays and mouths of rivers. This is the most beautiful of our Sheldrakes.

While the coloring is not brilliant, it is arranged in such artistic and harmonious effects as to make it strikingly beautiful and attractive.

The head is decorated with a hair-like fan shaped crest of white, the outer edge of which is tipped with black, giving it an appearance of a pheasant, and in some states, is called water pheasant.

It is the smallest of the Sheldrakes, being about 18 inches long and two feet extent of wing.
