This Thanksgiving Really Turkey Day

The American people ate more turkey on Thanksgiving Day, 1936, than they have ever previously consumed on that national holiday.

This information was received here today by W. E. White, local manager of the Safeway store. The statement was made by G. W. Heyworth, branch manager of the Washington Co-op Egg & Poultry association representing the Washington growers, and the Oregon Turkey Growers' association for the Portland market.

Ten days before Thanksgiving there were 20,000,000 of the birds "on the hoof." The average turkey is a dinner for more than six or seven persons, which meant enough turkey for every inhabitant of the United States, with some left over for Christmas.

There are more than five million farmers who grow turkeys. In many sections it is one of the few winter cash crops. As turkeys began to move into the markets it was disclosed that there were five million birds in excess of last year's crop. The market was threatened with demoralization.

This brought an emergency appeal to the national Association of Food Chains. More than 125 urgent telegrams poured in from farm groups, representing a membership of three million farmers.

The chain stores immediately threw all their resources into the greatest turkey drive that had ever been carried on. By advertising and sales promotion they increased the normal demand for turkey. They stemmed the tide of falling prices that threatened disaster to the producer.

The turkey drive is not over. It will continue during the entire month of December leading up to another big sale for the Christmas and New Year's holidays. It was not possible to consume 20,000,000 turkeys in a single feast and there are many left. The quality of the fowl is exceptional this season, the prices are low and the supply is still equal to the demand.

December 8. A law was passed at the last legislature abolishing these exams, which are given to teachers who have not graduated from a normal school, and requiring a nor-

mal school diploma for future instructors in Oregon schools. The schedule is as follows: Wednesday morning, U. S. history, writing, geometry, botany; Wednesday afternoon, physiology, reading, composition, general history; Thursday morning, arithmetic, history of education, psychology, geology; Thursday afternoon, grammar, geography, American literature, physics; Friday morning, theory and practice, orthography, physical geography, English literature; Friday afternoon, school law, algebra, civil government, bookkeeping.

Teachers are required to take exams only in the subjects which they teach, or wish to teach the following year.

County Jail Being Renovated

Work was begun Monday, December 14, on repapering, repainting, and cleaning up the Lane county jail, as a result of the report made by the grand jury during their last session. The jury reported that a new jail was not needed at the present time, but that repairs should be made on the old one. The trustees room, at the front of the jail, is being remodeled into quarters for juveniles.

County Pioneer Museum Proposed

Present indications are that Lane county's pioneer museum will occupy the present post office building, and a new building will be erected on the quarter block to the north for the post office, Cal M. Young, chairman of the museum committee, declared December 10. A letter was sent to the postal inspector of the Western division last week by the committee, offering to trade lots, and a telegram was received in reply saying that the plan was feasible, and that the matter would be referred to Washington, D. C., for further orders, Mr. Young reported.

School Bond Payments

The county treasurer's office will send the following moneys to New York on December 15 to pay school bonds and interest: School district 4, \$2,137.50, bonds due; \$4,633.75 interest due to Jan. 1; total \$6,771.25. School district 19, \$4,000.00, bonds due; \$797.50, interest; total \$4,797.50.

Bills are beginning to come in to the county treasurer's office on the WPA Oakridge overhead project. The county's share of the

payment, \$10,000, has been set aside from the O. & C. fund.
