Real Estate Active As Year Closes

As 1936 closes real estate is still active. The following transactions occurred during the past 60 days:

The Hattie M. Van Scholack ranch of 83 acres southeast of Cottage Grove was sold to George L. Francher of California. Mr. Francher and family will take possession about March 1 and engage in diversified farming.

The Minnie and Welby Hubbard place located just west of town containing one-half acre was sold to Georg Bjorset. This tract joins his present home site and gives him access to Lorane highway.

The Herman Bolton ranch of 56 acres in the Silk Creek district was sold recently to Norman C. Acton of Idaho. Mr. Acton and mother took immediate possession and will make several improvements on the place.

L. P. Sanford has purchased the William R. Everett warehouse and lot just off Main street west of the ice plant. Mr. Sanford took immediate possession and will substantially improve the building which will be used as a paint shop.

The W. V. McGee ranch containing 90 acres, about 2½ miles northwest of the city, was sold to James R. Hudson, of California, who will take possession about the first of March. New buildings and fences will be constructed and more land will be cultivated.

REA Loan to Electric Association.

The Rural Electrification administration has allotted a loan of \$65,000 to the Nehalem Valley Cooperative Electric association of Jewell, Ore., to build 54 miles of lines to serve 276 customers. This is a small part of the REA loans for line construction and wiring projects in 39 states and Alaska, which now amount to \$42,494,278. The interest rate is not mentioned in the REA communication.

Buffalo Moths.
Buffalo moths are not really moths at all, according to an authority—they are beetles, and their proper name is carpet beetle. Why they are called buffalo moths is not known—maybe because of their destructive habits and the fact that the larvae are rough and furry. There are six varieties of carpet beetles, but only four of them have been proved to be serious household pests in America. These are the common carpet beetle and the furniture carpet beetle. Noxious Weed Control Discussed

Cal M. Young, county commissioner, and Representative Ralph Laird attended a meeting of the state grange, Saturday, December 19, to discuss noxious weed control. Eighteen counties in the state were represented. Representatives were chosen from among those present to attend another meeting on the 26th of December in Portland, at which time possibility of securing federal aid for weed control will be considered. It is estimated that

there are 25,000 acres of morning glory in the state, 20,000 acres of Canadian thistles, 15,000 acres of quack grass, 5,000 acres of white-top, and 400 acres of knap weed, which costs farmers of the state approximately \$1500 a year to control. The law against Canadian thistles is enforced in Douglas and Lane counties, but is not in Marion and Linn counties. Mr. Young declared that it was useless for one county to attempt control if the others did not cooperate.

Pouring of concrete for the piers of the Oakridge overhead crossing was completed December 21, and work will be suspended until January 4, with the exception of grading. P. M. Morse, county engineer announced Monday, December 21.

Re-appraising Property in Cottage Grove

J. S. Gilkey, and James Burnell, from the state tax commission office in Salem, started re-appraising real property in Cottage Grove, Springfield, and Eugene, on December 1. They started this work last year, and did not finish, but expect to complete it for the 1937 assessment. Mr. Bunnell, who is working in Cottage Grove, is appraising land and business property along Main street and one block to both the north and south. The purpose of this survey, according to Welby Stevens, county assessor, is to equalize values in the town, and when it is completed, the property will not be re-appraised for several years.

Club Leaders Conference

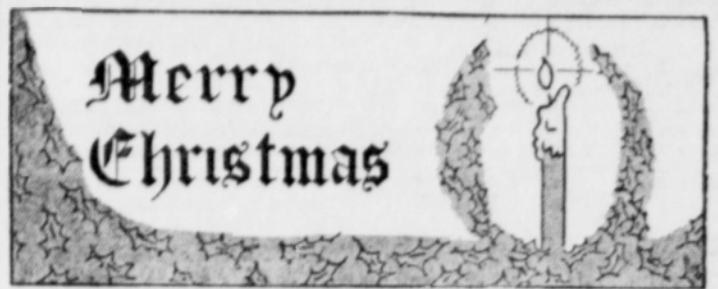
