Winter Classes For Adults Will Start Tuesday

George Beeryman, Eugene, Lane county director of adult education, was in the city Wednesday to complete arrangements for opening winter classes.

Two classes will start Tuesday night at the high school when courses will be offered free to both men and women of sixteen years and over. Beginning at 7:30 a class on the study of personality and psychology will be opened. From 8:30 to 9:30 a class in self expression will be started. The latter class will offer training on speaking informally before small groups or how to appear at ease before informal gatherings.

George Robbins of Eugene will be instructor. Mr. Robbins is starting his third year in adult education and is rated high in educational circles, said Mr. Berryman.

Providing attendance is good and interest is stimulated sufficiently, said Mr. Berryman, other classes will be opened and subjects along manual arts and mechanical training lines will be offered.

Adult education is a WPA project with funds available from federal sources. Classes have been conducted for the past three years in Lane county.

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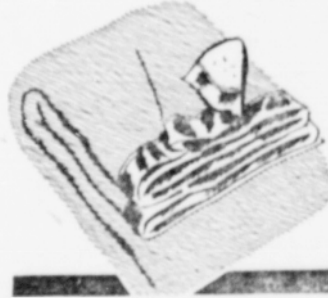
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
