Regular Reports Urged for Cities

By J. L. Franzen

U. O., Jan. 12—Concise and purely informative reports should be issued regularly by all incorporated cities, it was declared recently by J. L. Franzen, city manager of Oregon City, in a radio talk entitled "The Importance of Reporting to Your Citizens."

The talk was one of a series sponsored by the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Oregon over station KOAC at Corvallis. "Such reports would be of great value to the citizens and city officials if for no other reason than that it prevents the circulation of misleading information regarding the conduct of the various functions of the government. Lack of reliable information such as is furnished in properly written reports often leads to damaging rumors, Mr. Franzen said.

Two Injured

Two cars, a Chevrolet and Dodge, met in a head-on collision Wednesday afternoon about six miles south of the city on the Pacific highway. The occupants of the car driven by J. F. Tracy, reported to be a Piggly-Wiggly store manager moving from Hillsboro to Medford, sustained minor injuries. Mrs. Tracy was cut on the head and a small girl was cut on the nose. They were brought to the city for medical attention and later took passage on a bus for Medford. The occupants of the second car, said to be Culp Creek men, were not injured. The accident apparently was caused by the icy pavement.

Farmers' Cooperatives

The first boom in the farmer-cooperative movement came during the depression of 1872-1877. The Grange (Patrons of Husbandry), the oldest of the general farm organizations, had been formed in 1867. It was the intention of its founders that it be a fraternal order, but many farmers who found themselves caught in the depression following the panic of 1873 turned to the new organization in an effort to lessen the distressing consequences of economic maladjustments. In 1873, 8,667 local granges were organized, and the following year 11,941.
