**Boy Scout Officials Plan Organization of Four Rural Districts**

**At Meet in Eugene Tuesday; Wallamette Council Annual Conference Set for 26th.**

Rev. C. J. Hall, Joe Smith and Vinal Randall attended an informal gathering of Scout leaders and executives in Eugene Tuesday evening. The meeting was under the supervision of Scout Chief H. B. Sallee.

Tentative plans were made to organize the rural areas adjacent to Eugene, into four districts including Junction City, Oakridge, McKenzie River and Cottage Grove. Chief Sallee expects to meet with each center once a month and in the meantime members from each local Scout board will contact nearby communities for the purpose of stimulating interest in the Boy Scout movement.

The Boy Scout Wallamette council, comprising Benton, Linn, Lincoln, Coos, Curry, Douglas and Lane counties, will meet in Eugene Tuesday, January 26, for their 11th annual conference.

A banquet will be served at 6:30 at the Osburn hotel and Dr. Bruce Baxter, president of Wallamette university will be guest speaker. Dr. Baxter, a brilliant orator, has taken a keen interest in scout work
