Cattle Receipts High.

Cattle receipts at the Portland yards in 1936 were the best since the yards were opened in 1909, and general livestock receipts better than in any year since 1926, according to the annual report of the Portland stock yards, just released. Prices were favorable, although they did not come up to the highs of pre-depression years nor did they fall to the low levels of 1932 and 1933, but held well above those years.

Argentine Wheat Lowers Prices.

Wheat shipments from Argentine are rapidly undermining world prices. Top grades of milling wheat which reached \$1.37 are now around \$1.14 and local Oregon wheat which once climbed to \$1.19 is now around \$1.09.

Potato Prices High.

Potato prices continue at new levels with the demand strong and brokers taking on large stocks in anticipation of an even higher market. First grade Deschutes

Russetas have been moving at \$2.90 and \$3.00 wholesale. Klamath firsts have been at approximately at the same level.

Egg Deliveries Slow.

Cold weather has slowed egg deliveries with the Portland market still strong and very little supplies in storage. Oregon shipped 28 carloads in December mostly to New York City. Shipments for the first 11 months of 1936 were 303 cars compared with 250 cars in the same period a year earlier.

Rose Festival Entries.

Early entries for the Portland Rose Festival parade are the San Francisco Exposition to be held in 1939 through J. Franklin Bell and the State of Idaho by Clarence Detweiler of Twin Falls, who is chairman of a committee which will place an all-Idaho float in the procession.
