OBITUARIES

Clement Sarff
Passes Away
Tuesday Morning

Clement Lee Sarff, for six years a member of the city school board and an elder in the Christian church of which he was a member, died early Tuesday morning, following a lingering illness.

Mr. Sarff was born June 5, 1865, at Union City, Randolph county, Indiana, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Sarff. At the age of five he went with his family and nine neighboring families to Minnesota. The trip was made by covered wagon over prairie trails before the days of either roads or rail transportation. He was married November 10, 1887, to Elsie E. Hubert. Four sons, three living, were born to this union. They are Emmet of Tacoma, Wash.; Cecil of Chicago, Ill.; Ralph of Sioux City, Iowa. His wife passed away December 6, 1903. He resided in Minnesota 35 years and was associated with various business firms. He first located in Yakima, Wash., when he came west and stayed there 18 months. He then moved to Puyallup, Wash., where he lived another 18 months. From there he went to Salem, Ore. in 1911 and was a partner in the Roth Bros. grocery firm four years. He was married to Nellie Jones February 12, 1917 at Salem. To this union a son, Darrell Lee Sarff, was born. Surviving are the widow, the above mentioned sons and three brothers.

Mr. Sarff came to Cottage Grove March 12, 1919, and was engaged in the barber business until forced to retire a few years ago because of ill health. He was active in community affairs and had been an earnest worker in the church since becoming a member in 1902. He was an elder in both the Salem and Cottage Grove churches.

Funeral services will be conducted Saturday at 10 a. m. at the Christian church under the direction of Mills Chapel. Rev. I. G. Shaw, a former pastor from Springfield, assisted by Rev. E. E. Coulter, will officiate. Interment will be in Bellecrest Memorial Park at Salem.

Francis J. Sullivan.

Francis J. Sullivan, 45, died Thursday, February 4, at his ranch home in Delight valley.

He was born May 7, 1891, in Denver, Colo. He came to Cottage Grove from Oakland, Cal., and purchased the Almer Hunt ranch, north of the city, where he made his home for the past year. He was a member of the Catholic church. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Marguerite Sullivan; a son, Francis John Sullivan; four sisters, Mrs. F. S. Prabody, Mrs. George Connolly, both of San Francisco; Mrs. Walter Wardrop, Miss Katherine Sullivan, both of Santa Monica, Cal.; a brother, Maurice, Los Angeles.

The remains were sent to San Francisco for burial.

Thomas S. Cox, 71, died Friday, February 5, at his home on south Sixth street. Funeral services were held Sunday at Mills chapel with Rev. Henry W. Davis officiating. Interment was in the Masonic-I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Cox was born March 29, 1866,

in Cherokee county, Alabama. He had been a resident of Oregon since 16 years of age, coming to this community from Drain 37 years ago. He was a dairyman by occupation. He was married at Drain October 21, 1894, to Jennie Mariow, who, with the following children, survive: two daughters, Mrs. T. F. Marquart, Westfir; Mrs. Frank Braumbaugh, The Dalles; a son, Thomas Cox, Cottage Grove.

The deceased was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America and the Woodmen of the World, fraternal organizations.

Mrs. Arthur Monroe.

Mrs. Arthur Monroe, 45, former resident, died January 28 at Ashland, Ore., following an accident which resulted in pneumonia. A wood truck slipped from its moorings and pinned Mrs. Monroe between the truck and a wood pile, crushing her chest. Death came three weeks after the accident.

Mrs. Monroe came to Cottage Grove from Kansas where she was born. She was Carrie Hale, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Hale, and lived on a farm in the Hebron district. Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Kattie Pennington; six children, Dorothy, Herbert, Edward, Frances, Ruth and Paul; his mother, Mrs. Pennington, Globe, Ariz.; two brothers and three sisters.
