## Oregon Public Works Projects In National Plan

Public works projects for Oregon totalling \$5, estimated to cost \$27,102,000, have been included in the recently announced \$5,000,000,000 national program it was announced by Ormond R. Bean, chairman of the Oregon state planning board.

Projects which are located in Lane county are bank protection and clearing flood channels on Willamette river and tributaries, \$2,430,000; municipal water supply investigation for the Willamette basin, \$12,000; irrigability classification of project lands in the Willamette basin, \$25,000; stream pollution study, \$50,000; fishery survey of streams and spawning areas throughout the basin, \$17,000; and a state-wide study to determine methods for avoidance of losses in distribution and application of irrigation waters, \$50,000.

## Ski Camp in Bohemia District

A group of Eugene Obsidians returned to their homes Sunday after enjoying a week's winter camp at Champion in the Bohemia district. Headquarters were established at the Champion boarding house where a depth of twenty feet of snow was reported. The snow was drifted almost to the third story windows of the house.

It was necessary to ski four miles to reach Champion, members of the group said. Tuesday night a real snow was experienced when about a foot of new snow fell. The

party made a ski run to Fairview mountain, about 6000 foot elevation. They reported snow conditions ideal throughout the week for skiing. Twenty-six persons were in the party.

## Lane Shares in Taxpayers' Money

Rural Electrification Administration has announced additional allotments totalling \$1,236,200 for rural power projects in Idaho, Indiana, Mississippi, Nebraska, Oregon and Texas. With this allotment RFA has loaned or earmarked a total of \$32,987,478 for approximately 270 projects in 42 states.

The Oregon project is in Lane county and is known as the Blachly Power Project, which received an allotment of \$108,000 to build 87 miles of line and a portable 80 KW generating plant to be used pending the construction of a transmission line to bring power from the Bonneville Dam. About 420 customers will be served by this project.

Mr. Finnegan will leave April 1 to attend a ten day school of instruction in Eugene, going from there to Albany where he will have headquarters.

Henry C. Williamson Jr., a graduate of O. S. C. in '31, replaces Mr. Finnegan. Mr. Williamson comes highly recommended from the state college. He received his Master's degree in horticulture at Oregon State in '32. For three years he served as an inspector in the state horticulture department. He returned to Oregon State this year to take special training in the Smith-Hughes agriculture department.
