"UNREALITY" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 4.

The Golden Text was, "Surely God will not hear vanity, neither will the Almighty regard it" (Job. 35:13).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And Jacob was left alone; and there wrestled a man with him until the breaking of the day. And when he saw that he prevailed not against him, he touched the hollow of his thigh; and the hollow of Jacob's thigh was out of joint, as he wrestled with him" (Gen. 32:24, 25).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Jacob was alone, wrestling with error—struggling with a mortal sense of life, substance, and intelligence as existent in matter with its false pleasures and pains—when an angel, a message from Truth and Love, appeared to him and smote the sinew, or strength, of his error, till he saw its unreality; and Truth, being thereby understood, gave him spiritual strength in this Peniel of divine Science. Then said the spiritual evangel: 'Let me go, for the day breaketh; that is, the light of Truth and Love dawns upon thee. But the patriarch, perceiving his error and his need of help, did not loosen his hold upon this glorious light until his nature was transformed'" (p. 308).

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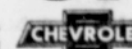


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
