Brown Trial Started Tuesday.

The entire first day of the Elwin S. Brown trial for first degree murder was spent questioning and selecting members of the jury before both the state and defense reported "satisfied." Five men and seven women make up the jury. The trial began Tuesday morning. The defense excused 11 of the jurors examined, on peremptory challenges, the state dismissed five, and Judge Skipworth excused four others who admitted to previous opinion on the case. In the preliminary questioning, the chief point which the state attempted to establish was the juror's attitude toward the death penalty which an unqualified verdict of guilty would make mandatory. The defense emphasized the fact that the state would probably use circumstantial evidence in proving its case and attempted to determine how much importance each juror would attach to such evidence.

Brown, 23-year-old Elmira youth, is accused of the murder of Peter F. Colgaard, aged Elmira merchant, March 2. Mr. Colgaard died in a hospital March 9, and Brown, who had been arrested by Cottage Grove police officers, was immediately charged with first degree murder.

Hot lunch service in six county schools has been discontinued during the past two weeks, according to V. H. Todd, WPA resident engineer. These lunches are supplied only during the fall and winter months.

County 4-H Club Meeting Saturday.

County 4-H club members who have finished their marketing project and turned in their essays will gather in Eugene Saturday, April 10, for the Marketing Day celebration. Members will meet at the Hellig theater at 8:30 a. m. and register. A free picture show, given by the theater management, will be shown from 8:45 until 10 a. m. The group will have lunch at the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, and will spend the afternoon visiting the county courthouse and various business houses in Eugene. Members attending are asked to wear 4-H tags in plain sight on their coat lapel or dress, as that will be their pass to the show and luncheon.

Judge Fisk Quells Salary Dispute.

The courthouse salary dispute flared again Sunday with the publication of figures compiled by Harry H. Johnson, president of the United Workers in Eugene, which showed a wide spread between the salaries paid administrative officers and employees. The survey revealed that while depression finances had resulted in as much as a 20 per cent decrease in the salaries of employees, the salaries of administrative officials had gone up as high as \$900. In commenting on the situation Monday County Judge Fisk declared that the 1937 budget committee had passed on the budget in November, and had adopted a resolution to the effect that no salaries would be raised during the year, and that there was nothing to be done.

County Clerk Dillard, Commissioner Holland and Assessor Stev-

ens were in Cottage Grove Monday morning appraising some county-owned land.

Primary Teachers Meet Saturday.

The County Primary Teachers' association will meet Saturday, April 10 at 1 p. m. in Washburne's auditorium. Mrs. Otille Turnbull Seybolt, assistant professor of English at the U. of O., will speak on "Choral Reading." The one-room Teachers' association will meet Saturday, April 17 at 12 o'clock at the Osburn hotel. Mrs. Hayes, art critic at the Oregon normal school will speak.

The annual meeting of the Lane County Public Health association was held April 7 at the Osburn hotel. Mrs. Baidie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon State Tuberculosis association was principal speaker. The annual report of the association was presented and officers for the coming year were elected.

Cottage Grove School Districts Receive \$5000.

The county treasurer's office sent out \$40,000 in county high school tuition order this past week. District 45, Cottage Grove, received \$5000. This money pays part of this year's tuition for students who live in non-high school territory and who have been approved by a non-high school board. The balance of the tuition payments will be paid at the end of the school year when annual reports have been submitted.

O. & C. Land Grant Before Congress.

County Judge Fisk, Commissioners Holland and Cal Young were in Roseburg April 6 attending a meeting of counties interested in the O & C land grant, which is now before congress. Eighteen western counties were represented. Judge Fisk is chairman of one of the groups of five counties.

Best 4-H Gardener Wins A Cultivator.

The opportunity to win a garden cultivator is now being offered the 4-H boy or girl between the age of 9 and 18, who plants and cultivates the best garden in Lane county before the 4-H club fair. Those entering must be regularly enrolled in the garden project with the club agent. Gardens will be judged on general appearance, under which individual effort will be counted the most; plan of the garden; size, which must be at least 600 square feet; freedom from weeds; required five kinds of vegetables, and the garden record book which each participant must keep. The winner in each of the seven districts in the county, will receive a cultivator, and the winners of the district contests will then compete at the annual 4-H club fair. Cottage Grove is in District 7, which also includes Creswell and all communities south. Previous winners of cultivators will not be eligible for cultivators in this contest, but they will be eligible to compete for the county championship at the fair.

Rock Crusher at Steel Bridge East of Town.

The county rock crusher has been moved to the steel bridge east of Cottage Grove to resurface the roads there.

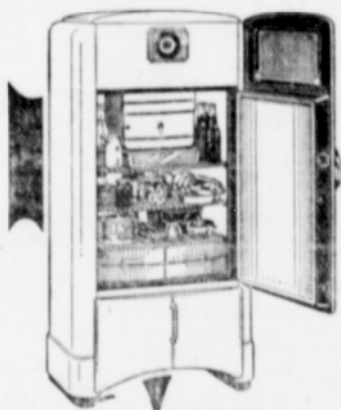
