Samuel S. McMahon.

Samuel S. McMahon, 51, died Thursday, April 15, at a Eugene hospital from injuries sustained a few days before at the Harris saw-mill south of the city. He had been struck with timbers while loading lumber. His skull was fractured and concussion followed.

Mr. McMahon was born February 4, 1886, at Maple Valley, Wis. He came to Cottage Grove about eight months ago from Iron Mountain, Mich. His wife had passed away before the family became residents of this community. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Arnold Jones, and Thelma McMahon, both of Cottage Grove, three brothers, James, Holmquist, S. D.; Will, Appleton, Wis.; Frank, Palisade, Minn.; a granddaughter, Dawn Rosga; He was a member of the Christian church.

The remains were sent by Mills chapel to Suring, Wis. for burial. Miss Thelma McMahon accompanied them east.

Dan Jones.

Word was recently received in the city of the death of Dan Jones, old time miner in the Bohemia district, at Seattle, Wash. Mr. Jones was nearing 90 years and had lived in Alaska most of the time since leaving here about 30 years ago. Ed Snyder, uncle of Mrs. Elsie Allison, of Fairbanks, Alaska, was an associate of Mr. Jones during the gold rush to Alaska.

During his mining in the Bohemia district Mr. Jones was associated with George Griffith and George Ort. Old timers recall the tragic death of Mr. Ort in the spring of 1893 when the three were packing into the mines. They were crossing Frank Brice creek on horses, before the creek was bridged. In swimming the creek Mr. Ort's horse was swept under by the strong current and took Mr. Ort, who was unable to swim, to his death.

John W. Clark.

John W. Clark, 55, resident of Drain Ore. died Sunday, April 18, in Roseburg. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at Mills chapel. Rev. C. J. Hall officiated. Interment was in the A. F. & A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery.

The deceased was born April 26, 1892, in Iowa. He came from Illinois to Cottage Grove, where he resided until going to Drain 12 years ago. He was a painter and decorator by trade.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Helen Clark; five children, Irwin and Edmund of Cottage Grove; Mrs. C. Overton and Mrs. Andrews, Smith River, Ore.; John Clark Jr., Drain; two brothers and three sisters.
