

John H. Cowles Grand Commander Scottish Rite Masons Southern

Jurisdiction of U. S., Which Includes Pacific Coast, Will Be in Eugene Monday, May 3.

Portland, Ore., April 15.—The forthcoming visit of John H. Cowles, 33 degree, Grand Commander of Scottish Rite Masons for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, which includes the Pacific coast states, will be of particular interest to Masons because Mr. Cowles recently returned from a visit with many Scottish Rite bodies in European countries and will tell of the condition of Masonry as he found it there.

As the Supreme Council of the Southern Jurisdiction, which is the Mother Supreme Council of the World, includes the greater portion of the United States, visits of the Grand Commander to the coast are not frequent, and such visits attract a large attendance of members of the Scottish Rite.

Grand Commander Cowles will be met at Medford by Louis G. Clarke, 33 degree Sovereign Grand Inspector General in Oregon. Medford and Klamath Falls bodies will join in a reception to the distinguished guests on Saturday, May 1. Eugene, Roseburg and Marshfield bodies will join in a similar reception at Eugene Monday, May 3. Salem and Baker bodies will come to Portland, where receptions will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, May 4 and 5. Elaborate arrangements for the visit are being made by the Portland bodies—Elbert Bede.

Three Cavalcades Leave Oregon for Frisco May 24

Three Oregon motor cavalcades, one led by Governor Charles H. Martin, and an aerial caravan, will converge on San Francisco for the Golden Gate Fiesta May 27 to June 2. Oregon's participation is likely to excel that of any other western state as Governor Martin is reported as determined to make this state's showing second only to that

of California.

The first Oregon motor cavalcade will join a contingent from the Pacific northwest at Portland May 24. It will leave the Pacific highway at Grants Pass and follow the Redwood highway from Crescent City south into San Francisco.

A second delegation will leave Astoria May 24 and travel down the coast highway of Oregon and down the Redwood highway to the bay city.

The third Oregon group will merge with a caravan originating in Spokane and passing through The Dalles May 24, and Klamath Falls on May 25.

All cavalcades will be so timed

as to arrive in San Francisco on May 26, the day before the fiesta opens.

It is also reported that Portland will send its Rose Queen to San Francisco for the bridge opening celebration and arrangements were being made to obtain a hundred horses for the cowboys and cowgirls of Pendleton's famous Round up, who will participate in events there.
