County Seat News Notes As Related by Sentinel Reporter

New damage was wrought to Lane county's \$16,000,000 road system last week as the Willamette river flooded lowlands and roads throughout the county. Three sections of county roads were taken out, making them impassable, and a great deal of surface gravel was washed away. The oiled roads, which had not been repaired since the freeze, were also damaged. Mr. Morse estimated that with the amount of money which his budget provides, only 40 miles of road could be patched, while at least 200 miles were badly in need of attention.

Lane county may install a unit of the naval reserve short wave radio network, Judge Fisk revealed Saturday. The unit would be used in such peacetime calamities as the Bandon fire, the blocking of communications during winter storms, and for navy communication during wartime. Amateur operators who desire to serve will be enlisted in the naval communication reserve, will be furnished equipment by the county court; will operate on the navy wave band, and will serve without pay, until a state of war is declared.

The re-appraisal of Cottage Grove lands and business properties was completed last week, according to Assessor Stevens, but summaries are not yet complete. The purpose of this re-appraisal was to more nearly equalize assessed values. For this reason the valuation of some of the lots will be higher, while others will be lower. There is a small increase in the valuation of land as a whole, Mr. Stevens said.

Information and rules for the county elementary school track meet to be held at the fair grounds May 15, has been sent to 4 H clubs and school principals. A plaque will be given to the county champions.

Lane county's share of the state liquor tax for first quarter of 1937, \$673.56, was received by the county treasurer last week. This amount and that sent to the cities in the county totaled \$1270.67. Cottage Grove received \$57.67 of this total sum.

The tax turnover for the past week was \$16,603.85, of this sum \$7,597.61 was for 1937. The balance was for former years.
