

County Seat News Notes As Related by Sentinel Reporter

One thousand ninety-six Lane county children from rural schools will gather in Eugene, Friday, April 30, to participate in the annual spring music festival. This festival is being held to stimulate interest in music in the rural schools. There will be eight different divisions in the festival this year, including the primary chorus, made up of children from grades 1, 2 and 3, and led by Louise Wynne, Santa Clara; the rhythm band from the same grades led by Lena Rasmussen, River Road; the intermediate chorus, grades 4, 5 and 6, led by Lucille Gowdy, Chase Gardens; the harmonica band, led by Elsie Dann, Creswell; the upper grades chorus, grades 7 and 8, led by Crystal Male, Springfield; the folk dance for lower grades, under the direction of Lelah Parks, Lynx Hollow; and the orchestra, conducted by Dona Broughton, Junction City. The festival will open with group singing of "America", led by Mrs. Anna Landisbeck Beck, professor of public school music at the University of Oregon, and will be followed by the flag salute given by the children. Mrs. Beck will also lead the closing song of the festival. Rehearsals will begin at 1 o'clock, and the program begins at 2 p. m. There will be no admission charge.

Marriage licenses were issued from the county clerk's office to Arthur W. Ritter and Audrey Cox of Cottage Grove, on April 23; and to George H. Booth, Cottage Grove, and Mary E. Harrington, Noti, on April 24.

A weekend camping trip at Blue Mountain is the treat awaiting members of 4-H forestry clubs. The trip will be held Saturday and Sunday, May 1 and 2, and one night will be spent in camp. Boys desiring to go will meet Saturday at 10 a. m. at the Blue Mountain school, which is six miles from Cottage Grove, up Mosby Creek. Instead of planting trees around the country as they have done in previous years, club members will start their own arboretum this year on the Camp Flk, 4-H camp site, which belongs to Lane county club members.

Members are asked to arrange for their own transportation, either individually or by clubs. Fathers are welcome to come, and each boy should have a partner. Boys should bring food for Saturday lunch and dinner, and Sunday breakfast and dinner; as well as cooking utensils, and bedding. There is adequate shelter at the camp site, so the trip will be held, rain or shine.

The Oakridge overhead crossing project was completed last Saturday, and P. M. Morse, county engineer filed his acceptance of it Monday, April 26. The county court will go to Oakridge Tuesday to inspect it before it files its acceptance.

The county rock crusher is now east of Cottage Grove on the Row River road, putting out rock for the Rat Creek road, which is being used by a Dorena lumber mill. The rock is also being used to build up maintenance piles around the country for use next fall and winter. P. M. Morse, county engineer reported. Patching of oil roads is being carried on as fast as the weather permits, Mr. Morse declared.

The county expects to open the Hawley rock ledge quarry, east of Lorane, in the near future. The rock crusher will be there next summer. The roads around Lorane are badly in need of repair, Mr. Morse said.

Dr. E. L. Gardner, county health officer, will speak before the Florence Health association Friday, April 30, on the prevention and control of tuberculosis.

A petition for a referendum on the anti-price discrimination bill is being circulated about the state by George Stanley, Eugene, who proposed it. Nearly 1800 names have already been secured and are being checked at the county clerk's office to determine whether or not the signers are registered voters. Mr. Stanley expects to go to Portland this week to obtain additional signatures. Twelve thousand names are required before the measure can go on the ballot.

Another petition for a referendum on the pinball machine bills passed by the last session of the legislature, has been filed in the county clerk's office. This petition contains 78 names, and more names are expected to be filed soon.

Work in building a new set of bleachers and adding another section to the present grandstand at the fairgrounds in Eugene, will be started this week, and will be completed for the Oregon Trail pageant, July 22, 23 and 24, the county court, and R. C. Kuehner, secretary of the fair board announced Monday. The WPA project for the labor has not been approved yet, but the court has been assured that it soon will be passed, and so is going ahead with the work.

Frederick M. Duckles, member of the board of managers of the American Society for Hard of Hearing, was in Eugene, Friday, April 23, when he addressed the Eugene society. A meeting was also held in the evening for doctors and nurses interested in the hearing apparatus and work which Mr. Duckles has done.

This lecture was especially interesting to the Lane County Health association because it has been carrying out an extensive hearing test program in the county schools. Nearly 2,500 children have been tested. Some follow-up work has been done and a program is being arranged so that this work may be carried out through the next school year.

Cottage Grove school districts received \$10,685.96 as their share of special tax money sent out to various county schools last Friday. The treasurer's office sent out \$41,642.94 to the different districts Monday, April 26.
