ROSEBURG CLAWED BY C. G. LIONS IN DUAL MEET

Although handicapped by a wet and soggy field and with only a few days of outdoor practice the

Cottage Grove track team were victors over Roseburg high in their first track meet of the season Saturday at Kelly field, scoring 69 points to Roseburg's 53. The dual meet is an annual competition between the schools.

Three records were established by members of the local team as follows: Javelin, Virgil Guggisberg, 162 feet 10 inches, to better the old mark of 155 feet; Herschel Tracy who broke the pole vault record by three inches, vaulting 10 feet, 6 inches, and the discus by 6 feet, throwing the platter 106 feet, 8 1/4 inches. Tracy was high point man of the meet with 15 points. Virgil Guggisberg was second with 15 points, and Don Thies, Cottage Grove and P. Rutual, Roseburg, tied for third with 11 points each.

The Cottage Grove track squad will attend the first annual Hayward Interscholastic Relays to be held in Eugene Saturday, May 1, at 2 p. m. The Lions are weak on dash men but have a good group of distance and field men.

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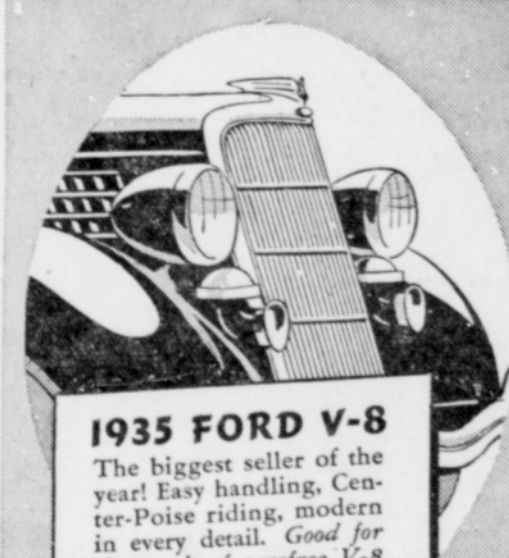
