

Prices Rise for Oregon Fruits



Oregon fruits, particularly pears and apples, are tending to establish seasonal high prices these days on northern auction markets. Typical of the scenes enacted daily are buyers (above) inspecting fruit on display floor prior to sale, and an auctioneer (right) receiving competitive bids.

The fruit and vegetable auction market system, observing this year its 110th anniversary, returns more than \$130,000,000 annually to growers, and supplies 40,000,000 consumers. Auction markets are situated in Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Detroit, New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, and St. Louis.



Teachers Vision New Progressive Gradeless School

The child in the progressive school of the future will not find his path of learning strawn with obstacles such as grades, "marks," formal recitations, graduation and other routine fixtures of the "old school," but will find instead a straight road along which he will be guided and encouraged by a friendly teacher, whose thought is for the natural mental, physical and racial development of youth.

This was the attractive picture—admittedly as yet little more than an ideal and a vision—held forth to more than 1,000 teachers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, at the northwest regional conference of the Progressive Education association, held at the University of Oregon recently.

Dr. George W. Frazier, president of the Colorado State College of Education, drew a sharp contrast between the "old school" and the "new school." The new schools substitutes groups for grades, the teacher becomes a leader, friend and counsellor, and education is a continuous process instead of being divided up by "grades" and terminated by "graduation," he declared.

A sound mental health is basic in the education of children and this must be achieved by the teacher, who in turn must observe fundamental principles of mental hygiene, it was declared by Dr. Carson Ryan Jr., president of the Progressive Education association.

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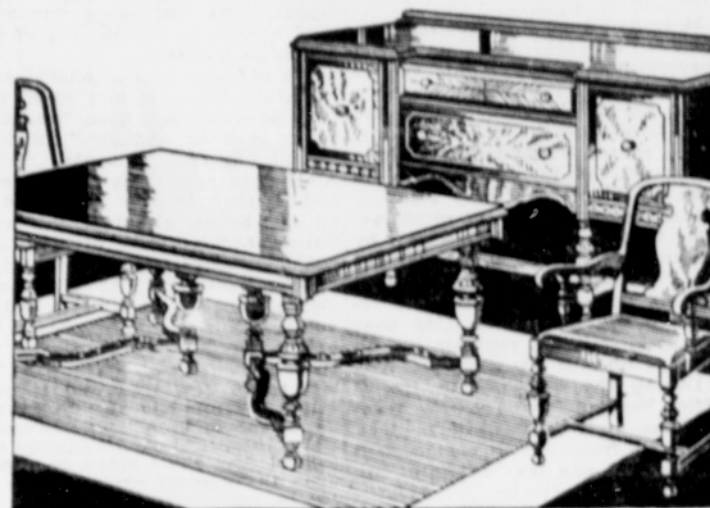
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Notice of Clean-Up Time
