

President Roosevelt Reported Interested In Lauren Coulter

It Is Quite Probable that
Federal Funds Will Be Made
Available for His Treatment.

The free will offering at the benefit program given for Lauren Coulter, who is suffering from a broken back, amounted to \$55.18. A large number of people were present and many business men who could not attend sent in their offerings. Each member of the crew of men working at the Eastburn sawmill are giving one-half of a day's wage to aid the young lad's recovery.

The boy is reported as getting along nicely and as greatly appreciating all that is being done in his behalf.

Reverend Coulter, the boy's uncle, informs the Sentinel that President Roosevelt has requested the state of Oregon to aid the unfortunate youth and that the president has informed Lauren through the U. S. Department of Labor, Children's Bureau, Crippled Children's Division, of which Dr. R. C. Hood is director, that under the Social Security act federal funds are available for medical care and treatment of crippled children, but that this fund must be disbursed through some state agency and that as yet Oregon has no plan worked out for this service.

A request has been made through the federal bureau that the Oregon State Department of Health get in touch with Lauren and determine what can be done to make him more comfortable and see that he has proper care. As yet no word has been received from the health department.

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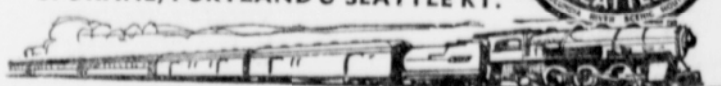
