ALCOHOL

What Alcohol Is and What Effect It Has When Consumed in Beer, Wine or Cocktails.

In these days of fast-moving cars, trains and other machines, one has to have a clear head and be able to think quickly in times of danger. This means that one should abstain from alcohol in any form, as alcohol will affect the mind and is detrimental to quick thinking and quick acting.

Alcohol is a colorless, inflammable liquid, which has an agreeable odor and a burning taste. It is made of the juices of grapes, apples and various other fruits, as well as grains and other materials containing starch, after it has been made into sugar form.

Alcohol affects the mind and makes a person unable to think quickly, and in times of emergency, such actions are the frequent cause of accidents. This is especially true when the alcohol consumer is the driver of an automobile or other vehicle.

When alcohol is drunk it undergoes oxidation in the body, just as sugar, starch and other substantially similar materials do. It is a narcotic. In its first effects it produces high spirits and a feeling of exhilaration. Then, as its gets possession of the nerves, it paralyzes the drinker, and in its final stages, can cause death.

Alcohol has many uses other than as a beverage. As it never freezes it is used in cold countries for thermometers. It is also used in medicines, mixed with other ingredients. When taken alone it is a deadly poison. Brandy, whiskey, rum and gin, which are called distilled liquors, have at least as much water content as alcohol. Many people think alcohol is a tonic and will cure sickness. This, however, is not true, as any good effect it may have is only temporary, and the after-effect, will more than offset any good that one may think it has done for his physical well-being.

Any person who is constantly or habitually under the influence of alcohol soon loses his reputation in the community. He is prone to exaggerate, and thus his word becomes unreliable. He constantly endangers the lives of others by his carelessness, and may rob or steal when his mind is possessed by liquor.

Alcohol is a habit-forming drug. At first the taste may not appeal to one, but as it is gradually taken oftener and in larger quantities, as it might be in using a drug containing great amounts of it, one gradually acquires the liking for it and becomes dependent on it for a feeling of good spirits. A continual use of alcohol will eventually shorten life, and cause death, as it causes the heart to be greatly overworked. Besides its fatal effects, it is detrimental when taken in even small portions. It has a tendency to stunt growth, if taken in youth, and it will dull mental and physical alertness in general.

If a person wishes to excel in athletics, scholarship or good health he will abstain from alcohol in any form. Every athlete knows that alcohol affects his lungs, maybe his eyesight, and that eventually

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it wears down his resistance. It causes clumsiness and lack of proper perception. Most alcohol acts as a poison and interferes with the normal workings of the mind as well as the body. An athlete needs to have all his wits at their best and normal self, and cannot take the chance of dullness or bad habit.

It is the tendency of the medical profession, at the present time, to prescribe as little alcohol, or medicines containing it, as possible. A physician knows that it causes the nerves to relax, and thus makes the blood run faster. This lowers the heart pressure and expands the surface blood vessels, which, therefore, let more heat escape from the body. This is what gives the feeling of apparent warmth to the body, and what actually lowers one's resistance. With a continual use of alcohol the resistance becomes permanently lowered and impaired, and, thus an excessive use of alcohol has its eventual effect of general weakening of all body cells and a susceptibility to any disease.

In its origin, alcohol was not made to be consumed in the body, and the use of it for such a purpose, is really a mis-use. The Arabs used it in early times as a paint mixer and this use is thought to be the origin of alcohol. It is still used in paints and varnishes, mixed with resins and gums. It is used extensively in drugs, and mixed with various oils to form the base for perfumes and colognes. It is used, also, as an antiseptic and to preserve specimens in laboratories. Chemists find it a clean and valuable fuel. It is only reasonable to conclude that alcohol is intended for commercial uses, and has its value as such, but it is not a suitable beverage for human consumption.
