

Latham Better Homes Committee Doing Good Work

Mrs. Hugh Trunnell has been appointed by the National Office of Better Homes in America at Purdue University to serve as Chairman of the Latham committee for the purpose of planning the 1937 Better Homes campaign. Better Homes in America, incorporated in 1922, annually sponsors a national-wide program for the improvement of housing conditions and home and community life. Miss Annabelle Gierist and Mrs. Lon Henderson are the other members of the committee for this year. Both are moving into homes of their own next year. The Hendersons have recently purchased an acreage near Creswell.

The Latham school through its 4-H clubs and cooperation with parents has for some time assisted in the development of home and community life. It has been the policy of the committee to strive to assist people in working out their desires in a constructive way rather than to promote contests under very uneven working conditions. To this end a Home Information Center was established several years ago. A part of this material is now available at the Cottage Grove library. Practical bulletins on housing from Purdue University are to be had. Anyone who has new magazines or other reading matter to contribute or lend to the library will be helping someone to find the aid they need.

Among others who have assisted the Better Homes committee are Miss Marian Notved, instructor of home economics in Cottage Grove high school, through exhibits and adult instruction; Rev. James A. Smith in a Better Homes sermon, and the First National bank through daily educational assistance in solving the financial side of home life.

The Latham P.T.A. Study club at its meeting Monday evening reported many items under home ground improvement, and interior and exterior home modernization. At least nine homes have installed electricity and several places are being remodeled. Two new homes are contemplated in this neighborhood during the summer.

While improving housing conditions is one feature of the Better Homes program, assistance in many types of home problems far deeper than that has been the service rendered.

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[[QUESTIONS THAT ARE ASKED ABOUT BANKING]]

"What is meant by a Bank's capital and surplus?"

The "capital" of a bank is the amount of money the stockholders have invested as owners of the bank. The Federal and State governments have minimum capital, and frequently subscribed surplus, requirements that must be met before a bank charter is issued.

In addition, the "surplus" of a bank is built up, usually out of earnings set aside to increase the protection of depositors. In addition, there are reserves for meeting known liabilities or guarding against contingencies.

The capital, surplus and undivided profits constitute an element of protection to a bank's depositors which supplements its policies of sound, honest management in safeguarding the funds entrusted to its care and applying them in useful loans and investments.
