Teachers' Groups Meet.

Monthly meetings of some of the Lane county teachers' groups were held Saturday, May 8, and others will meet Saturday, May 15. H. R. Gould, superintendent of Eugene schools will be the speaker at the Elementary Principals' association Saturday noon at the Del Ray. Meeting place for the Primary Teachers' association has not been arranged yet, but Miss Ida Mae Smith, from Monmouth Normal will be the speaker.

Keeping Rock Crushers Busy.

A rock crusher will be taken to the Mapleton quarry to obtain rock for the Indian creek, Canary, and North Fork roads. Other crushers are working near Crow and near the steel bridge at Cottage Grove.

Lane County Health Service.

With the coming of spring, communicable diseases seem to be on the wane, as shown by the April report from the county health office. Six cases of mumps, nine of whooping cough, five of pneumonia, four each of chickenpox and scarlet fever, three of measles and two each of tuberculosis, diphtheria and smallpox, are the total number of diseases reported. Under morbidity service, 27 were admitted to medical service, 31 to nursing service, 32 to hospitals, 655 total patient-days of hospital service and 350 clinic visits. The health office has also been offering protection in the handling of food and milk. Forty-eight schools have been visited during the month and 1,119 children inspected. Smallpox immunizations totalled 153, diphtheria 122, Schick tests 3.
