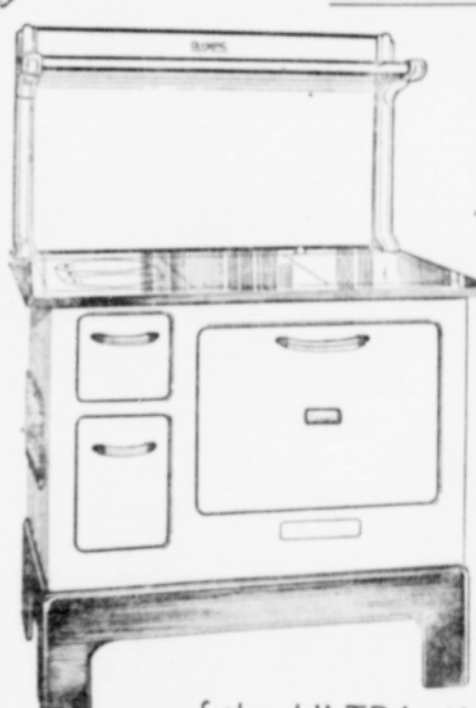
The Cottage Grove Cemetery association is putting in a water line from the faucet at W. W. Belle Burkholder, secretary. m20p
