

Licenses Expire June 30; Blanks At Sentinel Office

The Sentinel has a large number of applications for motor vehicle drivers licenses, which will be given to those who apply personally, on or before June 15.

Announcement to the effect that the new motor vehicle drivers' licenses will become valid and may be used on and after June 15 of this year was made by the department of state this morning. All present licenses expire June 30.

Applications for licenses are now being received at the rate of approximately 1,500 a day and according to officials of the operators' division will increase materially during the few weeks remaining of the present operating period. The fee of \$1 applies to both renewal and original applications. However, renewals of drivers' licenses may be effected by merely filling in a regular state form and mailing with the proper fee to the secretary of state or given to any of the regular appointed agencies, whereas, in the case of original applications or for those who have reached the age of 70 or for those having a questionable record or who have acquired any physical handicaps during the last registration period are required to complete the required examination for drivers.
