**P. Waldo Davis With His Triple Chimes Here 20th**

P. Waldo Davis, Eugene, who achieved national prominence while entertaining throngs in various state buildings at the San Francisco Exposition in 1915 as a chimes manipulator, will appear in a varied repertoire of musical numbers Sunday evening at the union service at the Presbyterian church. Herschel Davis, his son, who has a class of music pupils in this city, will be his accompanist.

The instrument upon which Mr. Davis plays is a triple chimes of a clever, ingenious mechanism, consisting of a double keyboard upon which 27 chimes are suspended. Each chime consists of three hollow tubes joined together by a steel rod in such perfect fashion that all modulations in the realm of music can be effected. Tone is created by establishing a trilling effect in each chime and when both hands are in action a melody in duet is produced.

Mr. Davis has arranged a program of negro spirituals, well known songs endeared to the hearts of music lovers because of their peculiar pathos and sentiment, and masterpieces of sacred music. Rev. Henry W. Davis, pastor of the Baptist church, will deliver the sermon.
