Receives Scholarship.

Mrs. Ruth Hinegardner, superintendent of nurses at the county health office, has received a scholarship to the summer school session of the school for public health nurses in Portland, and has tendered her resignation from the county staff, to become effective July 1. No successor has been named. Applicants for the job must be recommended by Dr. Striker, state health officer, approved by Dr. Gardner and then appointed by the county court.

Dr. Gardner will begin his inspection of tourist camps in the county next week. He does this as a representative of the state board of health.

A pre-school and well-baby clinic will be held in Creswell Thursday, June 17. Diphtheria immunizations will be given.

Taxes Were Due Fifteenth

The second quarter of 1937 taxes were due at the sheriff's office Tuesday, according to A. P. McKenzie, tax deputy. Interest will be charged on all payments thereafter. A comparison between 1936 and 1937 payments will be made this week.

Willamette Pass in Good
Condition

The Willamette pass highway, opened several weeks ago, is reported to be in good shape by Mr. Morse, surveyor. A 15 mile detour is unopened and a little rough, but the rest is good driving. This highway, which comes out just below Crescent City, is a much shorter route to Klamath Falls than by the Pacific highway through Medford.

The county shovel has been taken to Oakridge to gravel the overhead. The road repairs between Mohawk and Hayden bridge were finished Monday, according to Mr. Morse. Other repairs have been held up by the rains.

A marriage license was issued to Elma Grabel, Cottage Grove, and Dalton W. Mattoon, Black Butte, on June 11.

Tax Turnovers.

Tax turnovers for the past two weeks at the county treasurer's office were as follows: 1937, \$20,079.72; 1927 to 1936, \$10,054.

An answer to Lane county's petition for a reduction in the amount

of gas tax due the state highway commission this year is expected to be made at a meeting of the commission Thursday June 17, Judge Fisk said Monday.

Payment on Bonds and Interest.

Checks for \$30,511.25 from District 5 and \$715 from District 19 were sent to a New York city bank Friday to pay bonds and interest. The first half of the 1937 forest fire patrol tax, totalling \$5,544.58, was sent to the state forester last week.

Man and Woman Arrested

Robert Brockman and Gertrude Albo, both of Lane county, were arrested Sunday in Bend on a car theft charge. The car belonged to a Eugene man. Brockman is 23 years old and has been in the penitentiary three times for stealing cars. He had been out of prison one month on parole, District Attorney L. L. Ray said that he would probably be tried under the habitual criminal law this time which provides for life imprisonment on the fourth offense.

Another "Mushroom" Poisoning.

An anticipated meal of steak and mushrooms ended in near tragedy for Harry Wilson, a transient from California, Sunday night. He was hiking from Eugene to Bend, and having already purchased a steak, stopped along the way to pick mushrooms. The mushrooms were poisonous and so Mr. Wilson's meal ended with a severe gastric disturbance and a trip to the Eugene hospital. He was found by a state policeman in an unconscious condition, lying beside the highway. He was said Monday to be recovering.

Pageant Rehearsals Under Way.

Rehearsals for the Oregon Trail pageant dances are well under way, and the first song rehearsal for the 600 voice chorus was held Tuesday night. Hal Young, professor of voice at U. of O., was chosen to direct the chorus and sing the two chief solos of the pageant. He will sing "The Indian Love Call" and "The Ranger's Song," both from "Rose Marie." Mr. Young asks that all who are interested in singing join the chorus for more voices are needed if the aim of 600 is to be reached.

Honorable Mention.

Eugene's float advertising the Oregon Trail pageant won honorable mention in the Portland Rose Festival, according to Cal Young, who drove the wagon. The float was a flower-covered wagon, drawn by two white oxen.

Damages Awarded Bicycle Rider.

A verdict awarding the plaintiff \$3700 for injuries received when he was struck by an automobile while riding his bicycle, was returned by a circuit court jury Monday, in the case of Elbert Hixson vs. J. H. McDonald. The plaintiff had asked for damages of \$10,450. The case of Edward Y. Swift vs. Walter C. Morris opened Monday afternoon. This is also a damage case.

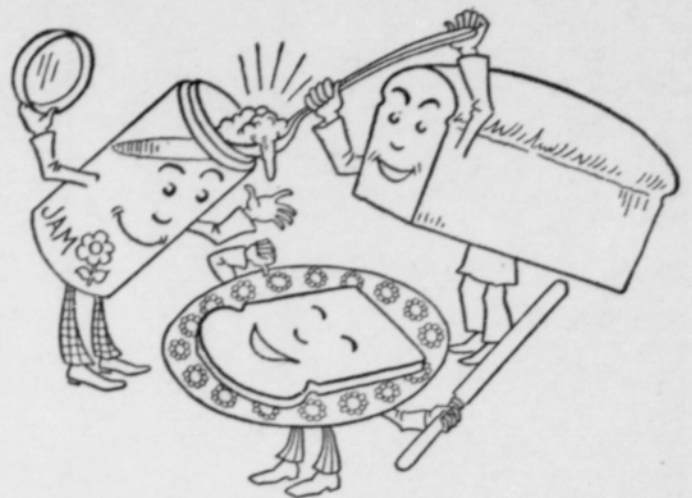
An Ancient Town
