

President Accepts This Forest Fire Poster



President Roosevelt has accepted in behalf of the United States government this dramatic forest fire control painting by James Montgomery Flagg, nationally famous poster artist. Copies of the original will be used throughout the nation by the forest service in this year's campaign against the ever present fire demon.

More than four million posters are being printed, several thousand copies of which will be distributed in Oregon and Washington.

Flagg, outstanding painter noted for his famous war time posters, notably the "I Want You" poster called by contemporary press the greatest war cartoon of all time, has this year contributed a picture of similar note. He depicts Uncle Sam in forest ranger uniform, pointing the finger at a burning forest over the title "Your Forests—Your Fault—Your Loss."

In an effort to drive home to the public their responsibility in curbing the vast economic and recreational losses resulting from forest fire each year, Flagg has made this notable contribution to the nation in its war against the present "number one public enemy."

"Mr. Flagg has gone straight to the mark," said P. A. Silcox, chief of the forest service, commenting upon the new painting. "His title tells the whole story in rapid fire style. America's forests are 'your forests.' Forests, no matter under what ownership, influence the daily lives of millions of people directly dependent on forest products for livelihood, and additional millions who use the forests for hunting, fishing, camping, and other forms of recreation. Millions also depend upon forests for watershed protection and for their powerful influence in checking floods."

Battle Fleet in Portland From July 16 to 29

Sixteen thousand men, 710 officers and 8 admirals will constitute the personnel of a battle fleet to mobilize in Portland harbor for a two weeks fiesta, July 16 to 29, according to arrangements announced by the United States Navy department. The ships are now engaged in war games somewhere in the Pacific and will make Portland their liberty port at the conclusion of these maneuvers.

The ships to rest in the heart of Portland's business district for public inspection for the two weeks will include 11 heavy cruisers, 4 light cruisers, 8 destroyers, one hospital ship, one destroyer tender and 52 of the latest type bombing planes. Also, the fleet will be followed in by a battery of coast guard ships, eagle boats and other government vessels.

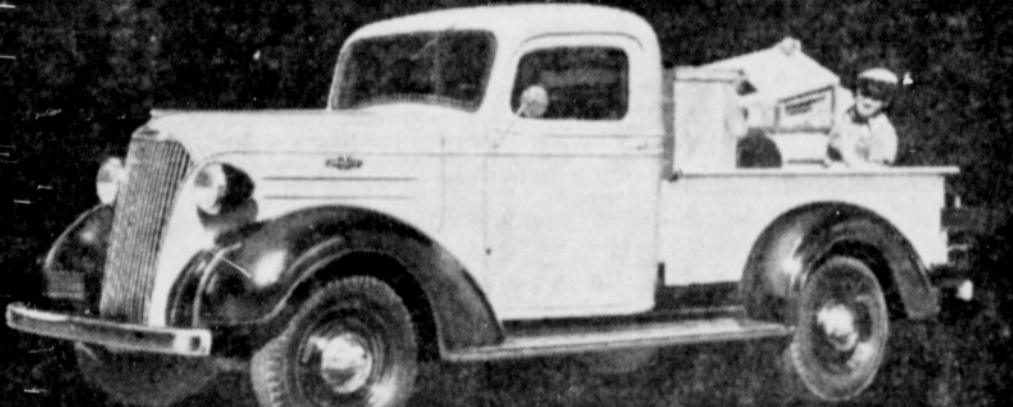
