The five are Mac Trask, Bill Workman, Carlton Woodard, Richard Smith and Vinal Randall, Jr. The train they will take goes south to Sacramento, Cal., through Salt Lake City, Chicago, Detroit, New York City to Washington.

The jamboree will last ten days—days of fun; days of hard work and days of visiting the many historical places in and around Washington, such as Mount Vernon, at once the former home and the tomb of the father of his country and his good wife, Martha Washington, situated on a high bluff overlooking the historical Potomac river.

At first view there may be a slight feeling of disappointment on the part of the Scouts, whose boyish dreams have pictured nothing less than a grand mansion, but the simplicity of that home of George Washington, with its low ceilings upstairs, its original furniture, the bed he died on and other sacred relics of the man to whom we owe so much, the dignity of it all, leaves a profound impression that one never can forget.

Then there is the typical colonial home of that grand democrat, Thomas Jefferson, the capitol building, the White House, Arlington cemetery, and many other buildings and spots, such as the old church at Alexandria, where Washington is said to have worshipped.

Then the return trip down through Dixie, Richmond, the capitol of the Confederacy, New Orleans, on through vast Texas, up through California and back home again July 16th.
