Log Hauling Stopped

Continuous rain for the past two weeks and the resulting poor condition of the oil roads in Lane county caused the county court to issue an order Monday stopping all hauling of logs and piling until the return of better weather. The repairs made after the freezing weather of January were only temporary because the damage was so great, and even these repaired roads are breaking down fast. Log haulers were notified by telephone and notices are being published in all the papers. This order does not apply to wood or lumber haulers, for this hauling is done on the heavier roads for the most part.

Arrests.

Sheriff Swartz brought Ray Watson, who has already been indicted by a Lane county grand jury for obtaining money under false pretenses, from Salem to Eugene Saturday. Watson was arraigned in circuit court Monday afternoon and will face trial during the June term.

State police officers brought Laurence Morris to the county jail Tuesday after he was arrested in Ashland for defrauding an innkeeper in Eugene.

Tax Collections Lagging.

Tax collections for the first two quarters in 1937 are lagging behind the figures for 1936. A. P. McKinsey, tax deputy, reports. In 1936, total collections from January 1 to June 15 totalled \$1,414,354.39, while in 1937 they totalled only \$1,339,615.44. Tax turnovers were sufficiently increased this past week at the county treasurer's office to require a separate statement instead of waiting for the customary two weeks. Collections on the 1937 current roll totalled \$54,673 and payments on delinquent taxes from 1927 to 1936, including interest, totalled \$9,344.66.

A Check from Uncle Sam.

A check for \$1,674.80 was received from the United States government by the county treasurer as a final payment for the Oakridge crossing project.

Damages Awarded.

A circuit court jury awarded Mrs. Lillie Hayes damages of \$2700 in her suit against Dr. George I. Hurley, Eugene physician, for malpractice. The plaintiff had asked for \$12,000 damages.

The case of Elizabeth Heustis vs. the City of Eugene was opened Monday. Mrs. Heustis is suing the city for damages received when she fell on a downtown sidewalk.

The annual picnic and meeting of Lane county pioneers will be held Friday at the fairgrounds in Eugene.

Mothers' Aid Pensions.

Nurses are now working on the records of families receiving mother's aid pensions in Lane county. The children in these families are required to have physical examinations and are being called in. This pension is provided by the government under the social security program. Fifty-four Lane county families receive pensions.

Presbyterian Missionaries Translate New Testament.

George William Brown, general secretary of the American Bible Society, says there is romance in sharing in the tedious, but fascinating labor which steadily increases the number of languages in which the Bible may be obtained. Romance, yes, when one considers the end to be gained, but it also means weeks, months, yes years of hard work when a missionary group translates the New Testament into a dialect, which varies in spelling, pronunciation and construction in almost every town of four provinces in the Philippine Islands. That was the arduous task accomplished by three Presbyterian missionaries in the province of Albay, Sorsogon, Camarines Norte and Camarines Sur, situated in the southern part of the island of Luzon. They were Roy H. Brown, Kenneth P. MacDonald and Stephen L. Smith. It took them several years, but they did it and several hundred thousand Filipinos, who who had never read the Bible, are now reading the New Testament in their native Bicol dialect. Dr. Roy H. Brown is now the president of Silliman University, a Presbyterian school, in the Islands. Revs. MacDonald and Smith and their families are still doing missionary work in Southern Luzon. Reverend MacDonald and his family are at present on leave.
