

Almost \$76,000,000 PWA Money Loaned, Allotted in Oregon

Bonneville, Roads, School
Projects, Capitol Building,
Bridges, Waterworks Included.

Folger Johnson, chief engineer of the PWA at Portland, who passed through Cottage Grove the latter part of last week and called at the Sentinel office calls attention to the fact that the federal government has loaned, allotted and spent almost \$76,000,000 in Oregon for the following projects:

"Outstanding in the non-federal program as it affects the state of Oregon are the loans of \$1,899,040 and grants of \$2,907,490 to finance the construction of 69 school projects, estimated to cost \$7,101,063. This includes the grant of \$329,621 for the construction of two high schools at Salem, to accommodate 1,200 students. They are being constructed at an estimated cost of \$732,490.

"Also of interest in Salem is the grant of \$1,125,000 for the construction of a new state capitol building to be used for legislative and executive purposes and to replace the old building which was destroyed by fire in April, 1936. The new building is estimated to cost \$2,500,000.

"The state of Oregon was also given a loan of \$2,000,000 and a grant of \$1,600,000 to finance the construction on the Oregon Coast Highway of bridges across Alsea bay, Coos bay, Yaquina bay and the Siuslaw and Umpqua rivers. These bridges are estimated to cost \$5,600,000. This work is now 100 per cent complete.

"Sewer works and related projects were given allotment of \$677,912 for the construction of 11 projects estimated to cost \$844,597, while waterworks systems were allotted \$681,444 for 30 projects estimated to cost \$744,907.

"The Bonneville project is being constructed at a total cost of \$48,000,000. A total of 13,477,953 man-hours of site labor was provided by this allotment to June 1, 1937. The peak of employment here was reached in March, 1936, when 4,484 men were at work, providing 578,126 man hours.

"The Bureau of Public Roads received \$6,442,037 to be used in co-operation with the state highway department for the construction and improvement of roads and highways throughout the state, while the forest service of the department of agriculture was allotted \$4,139,696 for the construction of roads and trails and physical improvements to national forests.

"The Bureau of Reclamation was allotted \$4,810,000 for the Owyhee reclamation project near Ontario and \$1,000,000 for the construction of the Agency Valley reservoir and about 20 miles of canal for the Vale reclamation projects.

"The National Park Service is constructing roads, trails, sewer systems and general improvements at the Crater Lake national park with an allotment of \$813,239.

"To the Procurement Division of the Treasury Department went \$275,550 for the construction of new postoffice buildings at Hillsboro, Hood River and Marshfield.
