South Wants More Oregon Seed.

The demand for western Oregon grown Austrian peas and hairy vetch may far exceed the supply this year, according to E. R. Jackman, extension specialist in farm crops at O.S.C. The dry fall and succeeding cold weather reduced plantings in Willamette valley, so less seed will be available, while the southern states, stimulated by better cotton prices and the AAA program, want more seed than usual. Southern growers prefer Oregon seed for its greater uniformity and reliability, Jackman points out.

Ladino Clover Seed Shipped East.

Josephine County Ladino Clover Seed Growers' association, whose members last year grew more than half of the 100,000 pounds of this seed produced in the state, reports a healthy marketing year, in which substantial amounts of seed were shipped east for the first time.

Retenone Dust for Flea Better.

Retenone dust, mixed with diatomaceous earth or other finely divided material as a carrier, is the best insecticide yet found for the control of potato flea beetle, according to a circular just issued by O. S. C., which may be had free of charge.

Oregon Farmers Radio Market.

A more complete program of market reports and information is broadcast over the state-owned radio station KOAC by the Oregon State college extension service than is provided over any other station in the United States, it is revealed in a summary of Market News radio broadcasting for 1937 just issued at Washington, D. C. Most of the material used in the KOAC market broadcasts is received direct from the government market news leased wire service operated by the bureau of agricultural economics. News of trading in the principal markets reaches the farm listener within a few hours of the time the trading actually takes place in the leading cities of the United States and foreign countries.

Grass, Legume Acreage Increased.

Oregon farmers who participated in the 1936 agricultural conservation program made a total of more than 150,000 acres of new seedlings of soil conserving crops, according to a summary in the state AAA office at O.S.C. Approximately 14,000 applications for benefit payments are expected. According to N. C. Donaldson, secretary of state committee, there will be a wider participation in the program this year, practically 93 per cent of the crop land in the state is represented on work sheets which have been signed by farmers.

Livestock Industry.

The livestock industry of the west was urged to effect a stronger organization in order to be in a position to defend its just rights against numerous agencies interested in phases of land planning, by speakers at the annual summer meeting of the western section of the American Society of Animal Production at O.S.C. recently.

Valuable Fertilizer.

Legume hay, such as alfalfa and clover, that has been spoiled by the recent rains may be salvaged for use as fertilizer, says Dr. W. L. Powers, chief of the soils department at O.S.C. He points out that a ton of alfalfa contains about 40 pounds of nitrogen, which as fertilizer, would cost as much as 10c a pound. It also contains about 25 pounds of potassium and 7 pounds of phosphorus. It checks loss of soil moisture and does not depress growth. When applied in orchards at the rate of two tons of dry material per acre it will also earn soil conservation payments under the 1937 soil conservation program. The spoiled crop should be removed from fields promptly and if not applied immediately it should be placed in ricks for future use.

Oregon's Cash Farm Income.

Government estimates of Oregon's cash farm income for the past ten years, which averaged slightly less than \$100,000,000, have included the principal national farm commodities but not numerous specialty products, the current report on the agricultural situation by O.S.C. agricultural extension service points out. Among these specialty products are numerous kinds of grass and forage crop seeds, vegetable and flower seeds, flax fiber, filberts, peppermint oil, turkeys and miscellaneous poultry, fur-bearing animals, and others. The lack of this data has caused the state to be shown as of much less importance agriculturally than the facts warrant.
