Small Boy Loses Life in Siuslaw; Body Recovered

Gilbert Drew Severy, 8, was drowned Sunday night in the Siuslaw river near Mapleton. The body was recovered shortly afterwards by Don Neely of this city, who was spending the Fourth there with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Neely. Mr. Neely and others tried artificial respiration for two hours but their efforts were unavailing. No one witnessed the accident. The lad had taken a bucket of scraps to throw in the river and it is thought that he stumbled and fell in. When he failed to return home, a search was instituted. Mr. Neely dove for the body, on the first dive recovering the bucket the lad had carried, and on the second dive, locating the body in about ten feet of water about twelve feet from where the child fell in.

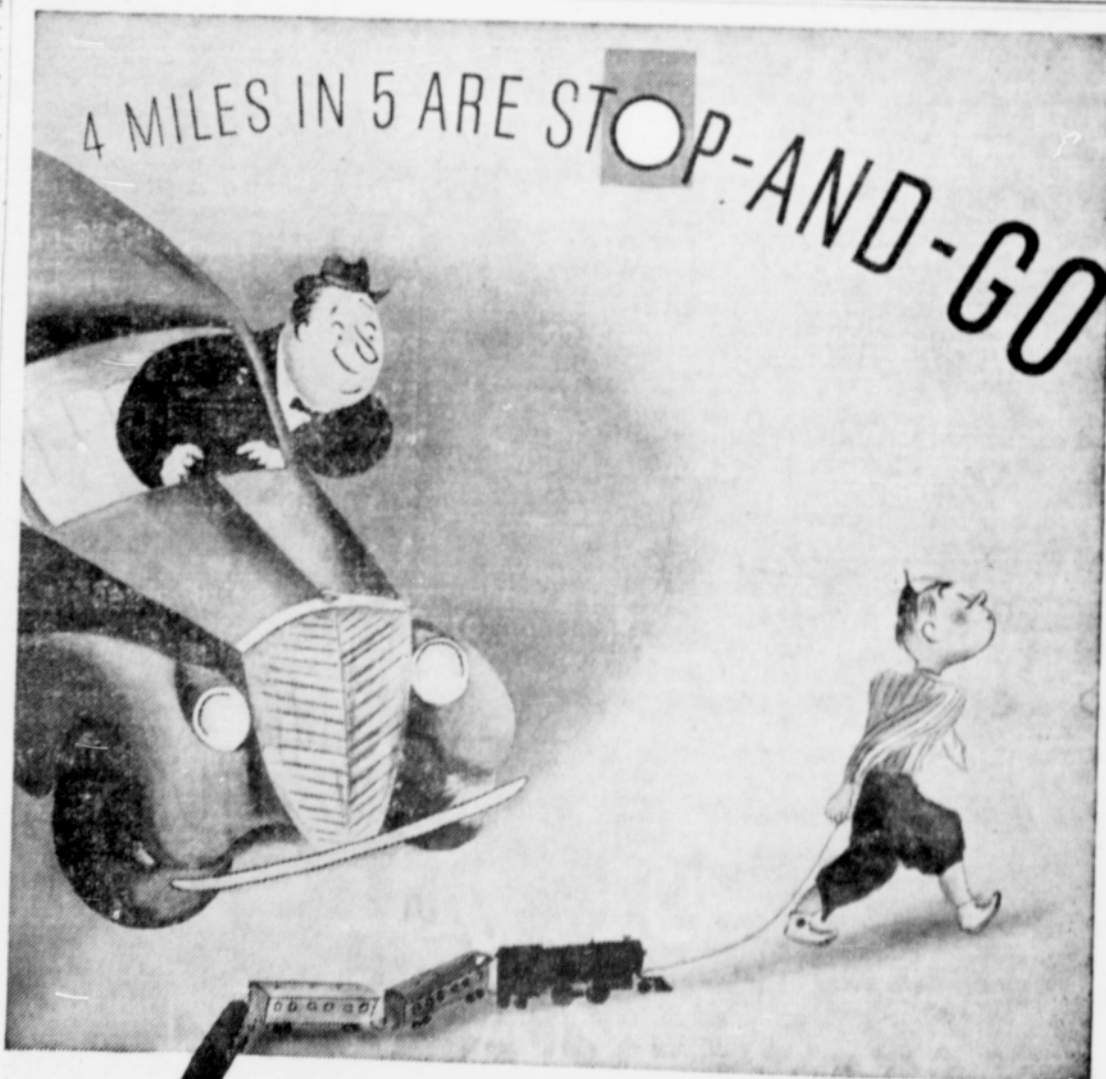
