Accidental Shooting.

An accidental shooting which resulted in the death of Boyd Owen, 43, stock raiser of Richmond, Ore., occurred early Sunday morning in a camp on Warner mountain in southeastern Lane county. Brady Potter, Owen's sheepherder, was cleaning a .22 rifle while the two men were at breakfast when the gun was suddenly discharged. According to Potter's story, the bullet entered Owen's right hip and ranged upward into the abdominal cavity. Owen died before officers or a doctor could reach the remote spot. Sheriff Swartz, Coroner Poole and a state police officer hiked into the camp to investigate the tragedy. Owen and Potter had been friends for many years. Mr. Owen was born October 10, 1893, in Missouri, but had lived for many years in eastern Oregon. He is survived by his parents and four brothers and three sisters. He was a world war veteran.

County Health Report.

Only 12 cases of communicable disease were reported to the county health officer during the month of June. Among these 12 were three cases of whooping cough, two each of pneumonia, chicken pox, scarlet fever, and streptococcus sore throat, and one each of diphtheria and tuberculosis.

Court News.

Robert Brockman, arrested on a car theft charge June 10, was convicted by a circuit court jury June 30. Immediately following his conviction, District Attorney L. L. Ray filed an information charging Brockman with being an habitual criminal. This case has been set for trial Wednesday, July 7.

John Howell and Chet Dick, arrested for uttering and publishing a forged check at Irish's store, July 2, waived preliminary hearing and were bound over to the grand jury.

Dean Douglas, a colored boy, was arrested July 2 on a car theft charge. Douglas was found 37 miles above Eugene on the McKenzie highway after he had wrecked the car. The car belonged to Harry Warren, Eugene. Douglas waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury.

Three California boys, Jim Huseman, Clarence Geurts and Glen Goods, were taken from a sealed freight car at the S. P. depot, Eugene, July 1, by state police and charged with stealing a ride on a train. They were tried in justice court and sentenced to five days each in the county jail.

Tax Turnovers.

Tax turnovers on the 1937 current roll during the past week totalled \$5,747.29 while turnovers on delinquent tax delinquents to 1936 totalled \$4,790.18. From this total of \$10,537.47, Cottage Grove gets \$9.58 while school district 45 gets \$176.81.

Another Appeal to Commission.

The Lane county court and District Attorney L. L. Ray will go to Portland Thursday, July 8, to attend a meeting of the state highway commission. The commission will discuss at this time Lane county's request for a rebate of \$42,500 on the \$85,000 in gas tax money which it owes the commission this year.

FOR FARMERS

Larger Farm Milk Checks.

Announcement from Washington that farm milk income reached \$602,000,000 for the first five months of 1937—\$33,000,000 ahead of the same period in 1936, 64% higher than the 1933 low and the largest first five month return since 1930—further emphasizes agriculture's successful climb toward pre-depression levels. While bottled milk and cream, butter, cheese and evaporated milk still are the major contributors to dairy farmers' milk checks, steadily widening industrial uses for milk by-products have also helped boost farmers' income, as was recently pointed out by Thos. H. McInerney, president of National Dairy Products Corporation.

Twenty County Outlook.

The last of a series of 20 district farm outlook conference reports, sponsored by the O.S.C. extension service, has been published. These reports which are available in the respective counties, constitute the most authentic guide to profitable farming practices in each region. The latest report, for example, records the combined opinions of growers and the specialists in the various fields on the subjects of apple production, fresh prunes, canneries, cherry production, small fruits, dairying, poultry, soil management and agricultural economics and marketing in this district. Under each section in this and other reports, there is recorded latest available statistics, a summary of production and marketing conditions, and recommendations for the future.

Baby Chick Men Meet.

The close relationship between the prosperity of the commercial egg producer and the welfare of the hatchery was emphasized at the annual session of the Oregon branch of the International Baby Chick association held on O.S.C. campus. Every effort will be used to cooperate with other poultry organizations. A resolution was passed endorsing the efforts to bring the Pacific coast and northwestern states together on a program of regional poultry research which would qualify for assistance from the department of agriculture under the Jones-Bankhead act. Oregon delegates to the International Baby Chick convention in Baltimore plan to go to Washington to urge the granting of such research assistance. The Oregon group also endorsed the move to have the poultry work in the department of agriculture centralized in a separate bureau.

AAA Officials Give Check-Up.

Now is a good time for Oregon farmers who are cooperating in the agricultural conservation program to check up on their farming practices and their base acreages to make sure they are able to qualify for maximum benefits under the 1937 program, according to state officials of the AAA. Soil depleting and soil conserving bases in nearly all counties now, making compliance before it is too late to make certain modifications, it is pointed out. Such a check up is particularly desirable on diversion farms to see that base acreage diverted from soil depleting to soil conserving uses is according to the original plans of the grower.

Aerial Mapping of Farms.

Aerial mapping of farms in Oregon under the AAA program will be resumed soon following the recent awarding of a contract for airplane surveys covering an additional area of approximately 3450 square miles at a price per square mile of approximately \$2.88 or \$800.04 for the entire job. Ground mapping of territory not being covered by the aerial methods is
