

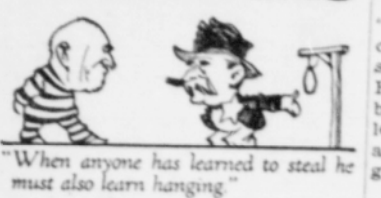

NEW YORK OFFICIALS PAY INCOME TAX.

Last month the New York state legislature and Governor Lehman signed a tax measure which requires the employees of that state to pay income tax, the same as other citizens. The new law is in accord with a law previously enacted in that state to bring federal officials federal pay within the purview of the state income tax regulations.

Similar laws should be passed by other state legislatures. There should be no favored classes in a republic. There certainly are no just grounds for exempting the personal incomes of federal or state officials and employees from paying income tax, many of whom receive larger salaries than thousands of people, not on government payrolls, who are paying this tax.

THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY CLEAVAGE.

"You may laugh about a \$36,000,000 debt hanging over the Treasury of the United States if you wish to, but with all my refined and expanded sense of humor I find it impossible to laugh about such a thing. In a time of prosperity we ought to begin to put our house in order. No one seems to worry about the debt . . . we spend and we spend and we spend and there are some of us who vote for all appropriations and against all taxes . . . the point I am making is that we cannot go on forever doing it."

A statement of Senator Joseph T. Robinson, Democratic Floor Leader in the United States Senate, in his first protest against appropriating public money to be spent without restrictions by the President and his spenders.

The growing block of Democratic Senators opposing many of the extravagances of the President and his Supreme Court bill is encouraging. In the view of most political experts the latter bill is definitely dead in spite of the "love feast" picnic held lately by the President for the Democrats in Congress.

In addition to the above it is an open secret that Vice-President Garner's departure from Washington for a vacation, an unprecedented action in an important legislative session, is due to major disagreements between him and the President.

All this seriously weakens the President's legislative machine in the Senate. The cleavage of the Democratic party is an actuality.

CURING SPEEDERS IN GERMANY.

News comes from Germany that Nazi officials have reached the conclusion that the temptation for reckless drivers to "show off" is reduced to a minimum at 30 miles an hour. And consequently, after a driver has been convicted of recklessness, his car is given a mechanical adjustment which prevents him from driving at more than a 30-mile rate. Furthermore, the machinery carries a police seal to prevent tampering, and you can imagine that the penalty for violation would be memorable.

This practice in Germany and the practice of auto manufacturers in placing "governors" on new cars to prevent drivers from breaking in the cars too quickly provides a new idea. Why not place governors on all cars so that drivers would be compelled to go at a safe maximum. If this were done a driver could pay more attention to the road and less to the speedometer.

STATE CAPITOL NEWS LETTER

Dr. J. F. Hosch for Governor.

Salem, Ore.—(Special).—So-called "left wing" members of the democratic party in Oregon are understood to be grooming Dr. J. F. Hosch, Bend physician and member of the lower House of the state legislature at the last two sessions, as their standard bearer in the 1938 gubernatorial campaign.

Hosch is said to be acceptable to labor, the Grange and the Townsends, three well organized groups whose leaders are out to "beat Martin" at any cost. While the Bend physician-legislator has not expressed himself publicly on the matter he is understood to be very receptive to the suggestion.

Hosch, one of the leaders in his last session by virtue of his dominant personality as well as his previous experience as a member of the 1935 session, served as mayor of Bend for three years and as mayor of Redmond for 12 years. He was born in Wisconsin in 1880 but was brought to Marion county, Oregon, by his parents two years later.

Political observers visiting Salem during the past week declare the Hosch boom is spreading rapidly over the state and is meeting with high favor.

In this connection it is also interesting to note that a movement is also reported to be well under way among conservative republicans to change their registration to democratic in order to help nominate Governor Martin for a second term in the event he decides to run again. This move is said to be gaining impetus with the failure of the republican leaders to suggest any candidate of a caliber sufficient to command the confidence of the rank and file voters.

Contract for New Nurses Home.

Contract for the construction of the new nurses home at the eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton was awarded by the board of control to a contractor employing only union labor but the contract for the plumbing and heating job in the new building went to a firm employing non-union labor. This, too, in spite of a threat of labor trouble. The board held that it was not within the province of state officials to discriminate between organized and unorganized labor in awarding contracts, so long as the successful bidder was responsible and agreed to pay the going wage.

Of interest to all counties which might be considering new court houses is an opinion by Attorney General Van Winkle this week in connection with the proposal for financing construction of a new court house in Marion county through a tax levy to be spread over a period of years. The attorney general held the proposal to be in violation of the constitutional inhibition against county indebtedness in excess of \$5000. The county, he held, could not enter into a contract in excess of the tax levied for the current year. Furthermore, he held, the levy could not be made until November and therefore could not be drawn against before that time.

Oregon Ranks High in Old-Age Pensions.

Oregon, though small in population and wealth ranks twelfth among the states in the average monthly pension paid to needy aged Governor Martin declared this week in reply to the "carping critics who call Oregon's old age pension plan niggardly."

"We have no cause for shame in the manner in which we are taking care of our aged people," the governor declared.
